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A letter from the Pastor... Fr. David Regan

It is an imperative mission for the Christian to grieve those who are passing and those who are mourning. It is a moment of loss, pain and mourning. It is also a moment of grace. It is a great testimony to the integrity of these individuals and families that they asked and permitted the Church to be present in these trying and difficult moments. Let us take this as an opportunity to reflect on the Sacrament of the Sick.

"In the Church's Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, through the ministry of the priest, it is Jesus who touches the sick to heal them from sin – and sometimes even from physical ailment. His cures were signs of the arrival of the Kingdom of God. The core message of his healing tells us of his plan to conquer sin and death by his dying and rising.

The Rite of Anointing tells us there is no need to wait until a person is at the point of death to receive the Sacrament...When the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is given...if it be God's will, the person be physically healed of illness. But even if there is no physical healing, the primary effect of the Sacrament is a spiritual healing by which the sick person receives the Holy Spirit's gift of peace and courage to deal with the difficulties that accompany serious illness or the frailty of old age." (U.S. Catholic Catechism for Adults)

We may be familiar with the term "Last Rites." This term is employed when the Church is present to a person who is indeed dying and can benefit from the presence of the Church at this moment of struggle. However, it must be stated that a person can be anointed without it being considered "Last Rites." Those persons who can receive this sacrament are the following: (Canon 1004)

1. The anointing of the sick can be administered to a member of the faithful who, after having reached the use of reason, begins to be in danger due to sickness or old age.

2. This sacrament can be repeated whenever the sick person again falls into a serious sickness after convalescence or whenever a more serious crisis develops during the same sickness.

These canons can be summarized as follows, those who satisfy three conditions may be anointed:

- 1. A baptized Catholic
- 2. Reached the age of reason
- 3. Begun to be in danger from illness or the infirmities of age, or have become sick again or underwent a further crisis. It should be noted that the danger need only have begun to exist. The person does not have to be "in extremis" (in imminent danger of dying).

"The special grace of the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick has as its effects: the uniting of the sick person to the passion of Christ, for his own good and that of the whole Church; the strengthening, peace, and courage to endure in a Christian manner the sufferings of illness or old age; the forgiveness of sins, if the sick person was not able to obtain it through the sacrament of penance; the restoration of health, if it is conducive to the salvation of his soul; the preparation for passing over to eternal life" (CCC 1532).

In our parish of Holy Name of Mary we have the means of contacting a priest when an emergency arises. Please call the rectory and at any hour you can reach a priest. We lovingly invite you not to wait. A family that is losing a loved one is not bothering anyone when they reach out. In fact, being present to a suffering family is a gift and privilege. You are giving a gift to the parish family by permitting us to do what we do best, bring Jesus. We want to be present. Jesus does save and heal. Above all, Jesus loves and is present to us more than we are even present to ourselves. "Anointing does not bring bad luck; it brings Jesus."

Safety During COVID 19

- *Stay at home if you don't feel well or have symptoms *Masks must be worn by all present
- *Sanitize your hands when you enter & leave the Church
- *Keep social distancing in the pews, as indicated by the blue tape, on the Communion line & when you exit.

Please do not remove any tape to make space to sit.

- *Bathrooms will be locked. All hymnals have been removed. Holy water fonts are not available.
- *Communion will be distributed at the end of Mass. Please hold your hand out FLAT when receiving.

As per Diocesan directives, you must not wear gloves when receiving Communion. Keep your face covering ON until right before your receive, then immediately put it back on after receiving Communion.

If you must receive by mouth, wait till the end of the line. The priest will sanitize his hands after each person.

- *There will be collection boxes placed in the main aisle where you can place your donation.
- *The Church will be sanitized daily at 2pm and after each weekend Mass. We may need volunteers at Sunday and weekday Masses to direct parishioners to seating areas.

A note from our Parish Music Director...

Many parishioners have been asking me when our Adult Choir will begin singing together again. Several people are interested in joining the Choir but wonder if they will be able to sing through a mask. I thought I might mention the latest directives for Choirs, Glee Clubs, and other singing groups, which most are following.

Scientists and other medical professionals have stated that when we sing we expel droplets into the air which tend to stay in the air for a period of time. In order for a chorus to develop a cohesive sound, singers must stand closely together. The six feet social distancing rule does not work well for a chorus and does not allow for a good choral sound to be produced. It is also not safe for the singers themselves since the droplets produced by the individual singer would fall on other singers. Additionally, studies have shown that when a chorus sings loudly, the droplets could travel at least 25 feet away from the singers, making it unsafe for worshipers in Church or people nearby the singers. Therefore, our parish Choir will not be resuming their usual program of rehearsals and singing at Masses until it is deemed safe to be able to do so, most likely when a vaccine is developed to control the COVID virus.

The members of our Choir are saddened that they will not be coming back soon. They would normally have resumed their ministry after Labor Day. They love to gather on Thursday evenings, spend time socializing and discussing various topics before beginning to sing and work on developing good singing techniques- proper breathing, use of head tone, pronunciation and diction, and learning new music. There is a saying- "this, too, shall pass". Our Choir will eventually be singing together once again when it is safe to do so. Meanwhile, if you are interested in joining the Choir when it resumes its Ministry of Music, please feel free to stop by the organ and leave me your name or call me at my office in the Parish Office, (516) 825-1450 Extension 221, and I will get back to you. Dear Holy Name of Mary Families,

I hope this letter finds you well and enjoying some summer sunshine. I am writing to inform you of the work we are doing to prepare for a safe reopening of school in September. Our reopening task force, in conjunction with Perrotta Consulting LLC, has been working diligently to ensure an academically sound, safe environment that will also provide for the social and emotional needs of each child.

We will be implementing a five-day, full-day program for all students in grades N - 8. (Parents/guardians will be able to choose full in-school learning, full remote learning or split in-school/remote learning.) Of course, this is all contingent on the Governor's guidelines that have not been announced as of the writing of this letter. We will accomplish a full return by making sure that the guidelines outlined for us by the CDC, State of New York and Diocese of Rockville Centre are followed.

Please note that we will have the capability to teach remotely if remote learning becomes necessary anytime during the 2020-2021 school year or if parents/guardians are not comfortable with their children returning to school full-time. Distance learning would be achieved with Google classroom, with students being able to log into classes and engage in learning in real time. Our faculty has been participating in professional development on enhancing distance learning. In addition, all the textbooks that we will now be using have an online component.

As soon as the Governor issues his guidelines, we will take some time to review our plans, make any necessary adjustments and then contact you with full details about the upcoming school year.

Regardless of the model used, the team at Holy Name of Mary will be ready to provide each child with outstanding academics, in a faith-based environment, where the well-being of the whole child is foremost in our minds. Enjoy the rest of your summer and please contact me if you have any questions or concerns.



REFLECT

FIRST READING

After Israel's return from their captivity in Babylon, Isaiah prophesied the Lord's salvation to all people of faith and good will, not just Israel. Why do you think some people resist the idea of God's impartiality?

SECOND READING

Paul sees the rejection of Jesus by the Jews as the vehicle for God's mercy to all, both Jew and Gentile alike. When has God turned a negative into a positive in your life?

GOSPEL READING

Jesus initially reacts negatively to the Canaanite (Gentile) woman in a manner familiar to most Jews of that day. But Jesus showed the disciples that faith in him transcends the historic divide between Jew and Gentile. When have you allowed your faith in Christ heal a division?

GOSPEL MEDITATION

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

We are hardwired for wholeness and crave it. When something is broken, we want it fixed. If a part of our body is not working properly, we want it healed. How often do we find ourselves saying, "I'm tired of struggling with this cold, I can't wait for my surgery to heal, or I want my treatments to make me better." Wholeness and healing restore our relationships and make us free to love as we desire. We know very well how our limitations, imperfections, and brokenness really limit us. They can easily prevent us from being and doing what we want to do.

Our physical and emotional wounds and maladies are easier to identify. If my back hurts, I feel it and know what part of my body needs attention. If I am feeling intense anger, I can identify the emotion and take necessary steps to uncover its cause. Being persistent often brings greater and quicker results. But will pursuing and even achieving our physical and emotional healings really be enough? We forget that there is a deeper healing that we seek and desperately need. As we look around at humanity, there are some physical and emotional wounds and scars that cannot be made whole. They are limitations that



must remain and, for one reason or another, cannot be rectified. Does this mean that the wholeness and healing that my being longs for is not possible for me? Must I settle with less than what God promises?

The answer is no. Ultimately, there is a desire that goes deeper than the physical and emotional. It is a desire that resides in our soul. What we really seek and thirst for is healing and wholeness for our soul. Inner strength, conviction, focus, grounding, love, hope, faith, courage, determination, peace, and connectedness are all words that center us on eternity. They direct

us to a presence we discover in our core, which is none other than the presence of God. In God, we are healed. When we are persistent in reaching out to and establishing our relationship with God, real healing and wholeness begin to happen.

There are some limitations and some of our brokenness with which we may simply have to live. This does not mean that we have to abandon our journey to wholeness and healing. If we have done our inner soul work, we have worked toward and acquired what and who we ultimately need and desire.

And behold, a Canaanite woman of that district came and called out, "Have pity on me, Lord, Son of David! My daughter is tormented by a demon." He said in reply, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." But the woman came and did Jesus homage, saying, "Lord, help me."
