The CCC (p.478), states, "Jesus has loved us all with a human heart. For this reason, the Sacred Heart of Jesus, pierced by our sins and for our salvation, 'is quite rightly considered the chief sign and symbol of that... love with which the divine Redeemer continually loves the eternal Father and all human beings' without exception."

In order to appreciate this rich symbolism of the heart, we remember in the Old Testament the word heart represented the core of the person. While recognized as the principle organ, the heart was also considered the center of all spiritual activity. It was the seat of all emotion, especially love. The heart has even greater depth when contemplated in light of the Incarnation. Jesus Christ, the second person of the Holy Trinity and consubstantial with the Father, entered this world taking on our human flesh. His Sacred Heart represents love: the divine love our Lord shares with the Father and Holy Spirit in the Trinity; the perfect, divine love which God has for us; and the genuine human love Christ felt in His human nature.

We hear our Lord saying "Come to Me, all you who are weary and find life burdensome, and I will refresh you. Take My yoke upon your shoulders and learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble of heart. Your souls will rest, for My yoke is easy and My burden light" (Mt 11:28-30). Therefore, while meditating on the Sacred Heart of Jesus, we are called to share in the love of the Lord and strive to express our own genuine love for God, ourselves and our neighbors.

Throughout the Gospels, we see the outpouring of Jesus' love from His heart, whether in miracle stories, the reconciliation of sinners, or the compassion for the grieving. Even on the cross, our Lord poured out His love for us: there the soldier's lance pierced His side and out flowed blood and water (Jn 19:34). St. Bonaventure said the Church was "...born from the wounded side of the Lord with the blood and water representing the Sacraments of the Holy Eucharist and baptism."

The early Church Fathers cherished the meaning of the Sacred Heart of our Lord. St. Justin Martyr (d. 165), said, "We the Christians are the true Israel which springs from Christ, for we are carved out of His heart as from a rock." Likewise, St. Irenaeus of Lyons (d. 202) said, "The Church is the fountain of the living water that flows to us

from the Heart of Christ." St. Paulinus of Nola (d. 431) added, "John, who rested blissfully on the breast of our Lord, was inebriated with the Holy Spirit, from the Heart of all creating Wisdom he drank an understanding which transcends that of any creature." These are just a few examples from the early Church where we find a profound respect for the Sacred Heart of our Lord as a font of His love which gave birth to the Church and continues to nourish its members.

Devotion to the Sacred Heart continued to grow during the Middle Ages and in 1353 Pope Innocent VI instituted a Mass honoring the mystery of the Sacred Heart. During the age of the Protestant movement, devotion to the Sacred Heart was practiced in hope of restoring peace to a world shattered by political and religious persecution. Shortly thereafter, the devotion escalated due to the fervor surrounding the apparitions of our Lord to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647-90). On Dec. 27, 1673, our Lord revealed, "My Divine Heart is so passionately inflamed with love... that, not being able any longer to contain within Itself the flames of Its ardent charity, it must let them spread abroad through your means, and manifest Itself to man, that they may be enriched with Its precious treasures which I unfold to you, and which contain the sanctifying and salutary graces that are necessary to hold them back from the abyss of ruin."

The four apparitions to St. Margaret Mary provided the catalyst for the promotion of the devotion to the Sacred Heart: a feast day in honor of the Sacred Heart and the offering of our Lord's saving grace and friendship if the individual attended Mass and received Holy Communion on nine consecutive first Fridays of the month. In 1899, Pope Leo XIII consecrated the world to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Since then, his successors have exhorted the faithful to turn to the Sacred Heart and make acts of personal consecration. They have also begged the faithful to offer prayers and penances to the Sacred Heart in reparation for the many sins of the world. Each week in June we will reflect on some aspect of devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

El CIC (p. 478) afirma: "Jesús nos ha amado a todos con corazón humano. Por eso, el Sagrado Corazón de Jesús, traspasado por nuestros pecados y por nuestra salvación," se considera con razón el principal signo y símbolo de ese... amor con el que el divino Redentor ama continuamente al Padre eterno y a todos los seres humanos 'sin excepción'.

Para apreciar este rico simbolismo del corazón, recordamos en el Antiguo Testamento que la palabra corazón representaba el núcleo de la persona. Si bien se reconoce como el órgano principal, el corazón también se considera el centro de toda actividad espiritual. Era el asiento de toda emoción, especialmente del amor. El corazón tiene aún más profundidad cuando se contempla a la luz de la Encarnación. Jesucristo, segunda persona de la Santísima Trinidad y consustancial con el Padre, entró en este mundo tomando nuestra carne humana. Su Sagrado Corazón representa amor: el amor divino que nuestro Señor comparte con el Padre y el Espíritu Santo en la Trinidad; el amor perfecto y divino que Dios tiene por nosotros; y el amor humano genuino que Cristo sintió en su naturaleza humana.

Escuchamos a nuestro Señor decir "Venid a mí a todos los que estáis cansados y encontráis pesada la vida, y yo os refrescaré. Carguen con Mi yugo sobre sus hombros y aprendan de Mí, que soy manso y humilde de corazón. Descansarán vuestras almas, porque mi yugo es suave y ligera mi carga" (Mt 11, 28-30). Por eso, mientras meditamos en el Sagrado Corazón de Jesús, estamos llamados a compartir el amor del Señor y esforzarnos por expresar nuestro propio amor genuino por Dios, nosotros mismos y nuestro prójimo.

A lo largo de los Evangelios, vemos el derramamiento del amor de Jesús desde Su corazón, ya sea en historias de milagros, la reconciliación de los pecadores o la compasión por los afligidos. Incluso en la cruz, Nuestro Señor derramó su amor por nosotros: allí la lanza del soldado le atravesó el costado y brotó sangre y agua (Jn 19, 34) San Buenaventura dijo que la Iglesia "... nació del costado herido del Señor con la sangre y agua que representa los sacramentos de la Sagrada Eucaristía y el bautismo".

Los primeros Padres de la Iglesia apreciaron el significado del Sagrado Corazón de nuestro Señor. San Justino Mártir (m. 165), dijo: "Nosotros los cristianos somos el verdadero Israel que brota de Cristo, porque somos tallados en Su corazón como de Cristo una roca". Asimismo, San Ireneo de Lyon (m. 202) dijo: "La Iglesia es la fuente del agua viva que fluye hacia nosotros desde el Corazón de Cristo". San Paulino de Nola (muerto en 431) agregó: "Juan, que descansaba feliz en el pecho de nuestro Señor, estaba ebrio del Espíritu Santo, del Corazón de toda Sabiduría creadora bebió un entendimiento que trasciende el de cualquier criatura". "Estos son solo algunos ejemplos de la Iglesia primitiva donde encontramos un profundo respeto por el Sagrado Corazón de nuestro Señor como fuente de Su amor que dio a la Iglesia y continúa alimentando a sus miembros.

La Devoción al Sagrado Corazón de Jesús continuó creciendo durante la Edad Media; en el año 1353 el Papa Inocencio VI instituyó una Misa en honor al misterio del Sagrado Corazón. Durante la era del movimiento protestante, se practicaba la devoción al Sagrado Corazón con la esperanza de restaurar la paz en un mundo destrozado por la persecución política y religiosa. Poco tiempo después, la devoción se intensificó debido al fervor que rodeaba las apariciones de nuestro Señor a Santa Margarita María Alacoque (1647-90). El 27 de diciembre de 1673, nuestro Señor se le apareció y le dijo "Mi Divino Corazón está tan apasionadamente inflamado de amor... que, no pudiendo contener más dentro de Sí las llamas de Su ardiente caridad, debe dejarlas extender y manifestarlas al hombre, para que sean enriquecidos con sus preciosos tesoros que Yo les desvelo, y que contienen las gracias santificantes y saludables que son necesarios para apartarlos del abismo de la ruina".

Las cuatro apariciones a Santa Margarita María proporcionaron el catalizador para la promoción de la devoción al Sagrado Corazón: una fiesta en honor del Sagrado Corazón y la ofrenda de la gracia salvadora y la amistad de nuestro Señor si la persona asiste a Misa y recibe la Sagrada Comunión los nueve primeros viernes consecutivos del mes. En 1899, el Papa León XIII consagró el mundo al Sagrado Corazón de Jesús. Desde entonces, sus sucesores exhortaron a los fieles a dirigirse al Sagrado Corazón y realizar actos de consagración personal. También han rogado a los fieles que ofrezcan oraciones y penitencias al Sagrado Corazón en reparación por los muchos pecados del mundo. Cada semana de junio reflexionaremos sobre algún aspecto de la devoción al Sagrado Corazón de Jesús.

Ways to Support Our Parish

Covid 19 has impacted our families and Church in many ways. This parish was pained by losing her kind and compassionate pastor, Msgr. Rom, due to Covid-19. Around Long Island, churches have seen an average decline of offering by 20 percent. Here at Holy Name of Mary, we are averaging a weekly decline of 30-40 percent in offerings.

- ◆ **Envelope System**-If you are a registered parishioner, you should be receiving donation envelopes in the mail. If you are not registered, please stop by the Parish Office to fill in a short registration form.
- ◆ **Faith Direct**-The best way to ensure our parish receives the support needed for our operating expenses and ministries is with eGiving through Faith Direct. It is easy to enroll; www.faithdirect.net and use our Church code, NY78.

COVID-19 - UPDATES

- *Stay at home if you don't feel well or have symptoms
- *Masks must continue to be worn by all present in the Church, even if you are fully vaccinated.
- *Sanitize your hands when you enter & leave the Church

- *Church is open weekdays from: 8am-3:30pm.
- *All entrances of the Church are open.

Get to Know the Saints



**"Let the rich enjoy their riches,
let the kings enjoy
their kingdoms,
Thou, O Christ, art my treasure
& my kingdom"
~ St Paulinus of Nola**

Feast Day: June 22

Saint Paulinus the Merciful, Bishop of Nola, was descended from an aristocratic and wealthy family of Bordeaux (France). By virtue of his extensive education and upbringing, the twenty-year-old youth was chosen to become a Roman senator, later he became consul and finally, governor of the region of Campagna in Italy.

At twenty-five years of age, he and his wife were converted to Christ and were baptized. After this he completely changed his manner of life. He disposed of all his property, and distributed the money to the needy, for which he endured the scorn of his friends and servants.

Not having children of their own, (their only son died in childbirth), the pious couple adopted poor orphans and raised them in the fear of God. In his searchings for a secluded life, Saint Paulinus went to the Spanish city of Barcelona, and in 393 was ordained a priest. Soon he left Spain and went on to the city of Nola in Italy, where he was elected bishop (His wife had died by this time).

When the Vandal barbarians invaded Italy and carried off many people to Africa in captivity, Saint Paulinus used church funds to ransom the captives. However, he did not have enough money to ransom the son of a certain poor widow from slavery in the household of the Prince of the Vandals. So, he volunteered to take his place. Dressed as a slave, Saint Paulinus began to serve the Vandal prince as a gardener.

Soon his identity was revealed to the ruler, King Riga, in a dream. Not only did he receive his own freedom, but he also won the release of all the other prisoners from Campania, and returned home with them.

Saint Paulinus is known both as a builder of churches and as a Christian poet. Among his many virtues, his love for mankind and his compassion for the poor and needy deserve special mention. He died in June in the year 431. Thirty-two of his poems and fifty-one of his letters survive. They contain various moral discourses filled with deep piety.

Diversión en el día de campo

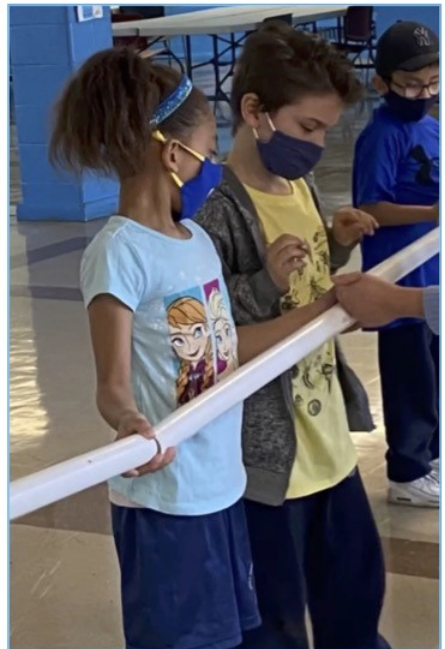
