In the upcoming year we will be focusing our efforts on Eucharistic Revival here at HNOM. Our concerted efforts will be driven by the person through whom we "...live, move and have our being" in order to do everything "Through, with and in Him." The following is a summary of an article I wrote a few years ago regarding Eucharistic Adoration.

Eucharistic adoration is worshiping the real presence of Jesus—fully the body, blood, soul and divinity of our Savior in the Eucharist. It is an extension of the Mass.

The Church teaches us adoration of the Eucharist extends our union with Christ after we receive Him during Mass. This worship of Jesus outside of Mass helps maintain what we received at Communion. When we put Mass and adoration together, we first consume our Lord so He becomes part of us, and then we gaze on Him in adoration while He gazes on us in total love. Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI explained it beautifully while still Cardinal Ratzinger in *God is Near Us: The Eucharist, Heart of Life*. "Communicating with Christ demands that we gaze on him, allow him to gaze on us, listen to him, get to know him. Adoration is simply the personal aspect of Communion. ... God is waiting for us in Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. Let us not leave him waiting in vain! Let us not, through distraction and lethargy, pass by the greatest and most important thing life offers us."

Before Jesus left the apostles to return to His Father, He told them He would be with them always. He is with us still in the Eucharist, resting silently in the tabernacle of every Catholic Church in the world. The words of Pope Saint John Paul II invite us to adore Christ in those very tabernacles. "The Church and the world have a great need for Eucharistic worship. Jesus awaits us in this sacrament of love. Let us not refuse the time to go to meet Him in adoration, in contemplation full of faith, and open to making amends for the serious offenses and crimes of the world. Let our adoration never cease." Our Lord desires that we spend time with Him and increase our longing for Him. It is a witness to our belief as Catholics that He is truly present at Communion and later in the tabernacle. And graces abound when we give ourselves to Jesus in adoration.

Spending time in adoration can be a sacrifice, but it's a sacrifice that produces the most amazing fruits. When you start your own adoration practice, you can start small and work your way up to an hour if you'd like. There are no rules on time.

If you have not participated in adoration before do not to commit to a goal that's too big for you in the beginning. That's a trick of the evil one. He works to have us choose goals that

we aren't capable of sustaining at the moment, even if it's a good and spiritual goal such as adoration for an hour each week. When we start to slip and miss one or two, we feel we've failed and stop altogether. We grow in our capacity to hold the silence. It's better to start small and increase as the call comes.

The important thing is to just get started. Bring Mary as your companion and guide. Ask her to help you prepare your soul to be receptive to her Son.

This is precious time with the Lord. Spending more time with Him makes us more like Him. Bring everything you have and give it to Him. He's waiting for you.

What does Eucharistic adoration look like? The word adoration comes from the Latin words "ad orare" which mean "to pray to." The Church offers several ways to adore our Lord in the Eucharist.

Holy Hour: You might hear adoration called a "holy hour." A holy hour refers simply to the hour you spend in adoration, usually at the same time each week. It's like an appointment you make with God to get to know Him better. It should be considered the most important appointment of your entire week.

Visits to the Blessed Sacrament: If your schedule doesn't allow you to commit a dedicated time each week for adoration, just stopping into a church or chapel to pray for five or 10 or 30 minutes when time allows is a great way to refresh your week. Just check the sanctuary lamp near the tabernacle to make sure it's burning—a sure sign the Lord is there with you.

Benediction: This is a form of blessing which can be done at any time during the church year. The consecrated host is exposed in a monstrance (a Latin word that means "to show") and those attending spend time in adoration. Prayers are said, hymns are sung (specifically the Tantum Ergo) and the priest incenses the Blessed Sacrament. The priest returns the Sacrament to the tabernacle after the Divine Praises are prayed.

Processions: Eucharistic processions usually use the monstrance as well to carry Jesus in the Eucharist out to the people like a parade. The most common Eucharistic procession is done during Corpus Christi. The monstrance is carried by the priest, sometimes under a canopy, with altar servers leading the way carrying the crucifix and candles and the people following behind the Blessed Sacrament.

The Eucharist is the source and summit of the whole Christian life. A Eucharistic procession, therefore, is a public witness of the veneration toward the most holy Eucharist, conducted through public streets. It takes place in this way: A consecrated host – that is, the real and substantial presence of Jesus Christ: body, blood, soul and divinity – is placed within a monstrance, which is then lifted and carried by a priest who leads the faithful in procession. Like a pilgrimage, a Eucharistic procession normally starts at one holy place and ends at another. This earthly journey reminds the Catholic faithful of their spiritual journey toward eternal life with God.

By processing with the Holy Eucharist in a reverent, prayerful and joyful manner, Catholics can honor Christ in the Eucharist and serve as witnesses to the intimate presence of God in the world and in each individual. Processions powerfully display the Incarnation, or God becoming human, and thus speak of his merciful love for all who journey to eternal life with him.

**Walk with us as we reverently process with the Holy Eucharist
from Holy Name of Mary Church, up Rockaway Avenue,
to East Lincoln Avenue, then back to our Church.**

**We will be accompanied on this journey by Bishop John O. Barres,
who will preach, bi-lingual, at the end of the procession.**

Light refreshments will follow on the Church lawn.

PROCESIÓN EUCARÍSTICA

SÁBADO 14 DE AGOSTO DE 2021 a las 8pm



La Eucaristía es fuente y cumbre de toda la vida cristiana. Una procesión eucarística, por tanto, es un testimonio público de la veneración hacia la santísima Eucaristía, realizada por la vía pública. Se lleva a cabo de esta manera: una hostia consagrada, es decir, la presencia real y substancial de Jesucristo: cuerpo, sangre, alma y divinidad, se coloca dentro de una custodia, que luego es levantada y llevada por un sacerdote que guía a los fieles en procesión.

Como una peregrinación, una procesión eucarística normalmente comienza en un lugar santo y termina en otro.

Este viaje terrenal les recuerda a los fieles católicos su viaje espiritual hacia la vida eterna con Dios.

Al hacer procesión con la Sagrada Eucaristía de una manera reverente, orante y alegre, los católicos pueden honrar a Cristo en la Eucaristía y servir como testigos de la presencia íntima de Dios en el mundo y en cada individuo.

Las procesiones muestran poderosamente la Encarnación, o Dios se hace humano, y así hablan de su amor misericordioso por todos los que viajan con él a la vida eterna.

Camina con nosotros en esta procesión con reverencia a la Sagrada Eucaristía.

El próximo año centraremos nuestros esfuerzos en el avivamiento eucarístico aquí en Holy Name of Mary. Nuestros esfuerzos concertados serán impulsados por la persona a través de la cual "... vivimos, nos movemos y tenemos nuestro ser" para hacer todo "a través, con y en Él". El siguiente es un resumen de un artículo que escribí hace unos años sobre la Adoración Eucarística.

La Adoración Eucarística es adorar la presencia real de Jesús, plenamente el cuerpo, la sangre, el alma y la divinidad de nuestro Salvador en la Eucaristía. Es una extensión de la Misa.

La Iglesia nos enseña que la adoración de la Eucaristía extiende nuestra unión con Cristo después de que lo recibimos durante la Misa. Esta adoración de Jesús fuera de la Misa ayuda a mantener lo que recibimos en la Comunión. Cuando juntamos la Misa y la adoración, primero consumimos a nuestro Señor para que se convierta en parte de nosotros, y luego lo miramos en adoración mientras Él nos mira con amor total. El Papa emérito Benedicto XVI lo explicó maravillosamente mientras todavía el cardenal Ratzinger en *Dios está cerca de nosotros: La Eucaristía, corazón de la vida*: "Comunicarse con Cristo exige que lo miremos, le permitamos mirarnos, escucharlo, conocerlo. La adoración es simplemente el aspecto personal de la Comunión... Dios nos espera en Jesucristo en el Santísimo Sacramento. ¡No lo dejemos esperando en vano! No dejemos, a través de la distracción y el letargo, pasar por alto lo más grande e importante que nos ofrece la vida".

Antes de que Jesús dejara a los apóstoles para regresar a su Padre, les dijo que siempre estaría con ellos. Él está todavía con nosotros en la Eucaristía, descansando silenciosamente en el tabernáculo de cada Iglesia católica del mundo. Las palabras del Papa San Juan Pablo II nos invitan a adorar a Cristo en esos mismos tabernáculos. "La Iglesia y el mundo tienen una gran necesidad del culto eucarístico. Jesús nos espera en este sacramento de amor. No rechazemos el tiempo para ir a encontrarlo en adoración, en contemplación llenos de fe y abiertos a reparar las graves ofensas y crímenes del mundo. Que nuestra adoración no cese nunca". Nuestro Señor desea que pasemos tiempo con Él y aumentemos nuestro anhelo por Él. Es un testimonio de nuestra creencia como católicos de que Él está verdaderamente presente en la Comunión y luego en el sagrario. Y las gracias abundan cuando nos entregamos a Jesús en adoración.

Pasar tiempo en adoración puede ser un sacrificio, pero es un sacrificio que produce los frutos más asombrosos. Cuando comience su propia práctica de adoración, puede comenzar poco a poco y avanzar hasta una hora si lo desea. No hay reglas de tiempo. Si no ha participado en la adoración antes, no se comprometa con una meta que sea demasiado grande para usted al principio. Ese es un truco del maligno. Trabaja para que elijamos metas que no somos capaces de mantener en este momento, incluso si es una meta buena y espiritual, como la adoración durante una hora a la semana. Cuando comenzamos a deslizarnos y fallamos, sentimos que hemos fallado y nos detenemos por completo. Crecemos en nuestra capacidad para mantener el silencio. Es mejor comenzar poco a poco y aumentar a medida que llega la llamada. Lo importante es empezar. Traiga a María como su compañera y guía. Pídale que le ayude a preparar su alma para ser receptiva a su Hijo. Este es un tiempo precioso con el Señor. Pasar más tiempo con Él nos hace más como Él. Trae todo lo que tienes y dáselo. Te está esperando. ¿Cómo es la adoración eucarística?

La palabra adoración proviene de las palabras latinas "ad orare" que significan "rezar a". La Iglesia ofrece varias formas de adorar a nuestro Señor en la Eucaristía.

Hora Santa: Es posible que escuche la adoración llamada "hora santa". Una hora santa se refiere simplemente a la hora que pasas en adoración, generalmente a la misma hora cada semana. Es como una cita que haces con Dios para conocerlo mejor. Debe considerarse la cita más importante de toda su semana. **Visitas al Santísimo Sacramento:** si su horario no le permite dedicar un tiempo dedicado cada semana a la adoración, simplemente detenerse en una iglesia o capilla para orar durante 5 o 10 o 30 minutos cuando el tiempo lo permita es una excelente manera de refrescar su semana. Simplemente revise la lámpara del santuario cerca del tabernáculo para asegurarse de que esté encendida, una señal segura de que el Señor está allí con usted.

Bendición: esta es una forma de bendición que se puede realizar en cualquier momento durante el año eclesial. La hostia consagrada se expone en una custodia (palabra latina que significa "mostrar") y los asistentes pasan un tiempo en adoración. Se dicen oraciones, se cantan himnos (específicamente el Tantum Ergo) y el sacerdote incienso el Santísimo Sacramento. El sacerdote devuelve el Sacramento al sagrario después de que se rezan las Alabanzas Divinas.

Procesiones: Las procesiones eucarísticas también suelen utilizar la custodia para llevar a Jesús en la Eucaristía a la gente como un desfile. La procesión eucarística más común se realiza durante el Corpus Christi. La custodia la lleva el sacerdote, a veces bajo un dosel, con los monaguillos a la cabeza llevando el crucifijo y las velas y la gente detrás del Santísimo Sacramento.

Get to Know the Saints



St. Lawrence of Brindisi
Feast Day: July 21

St Lawrence of Brindisi was born Giulio Cesare Russo in 1559 in Brindisi. He became a Roman Catholic priest at 23 and joined the Capuchin friars, taking the name Brother Lawrence. He was made St Lawrence in 1881, remembered for his bravery leading an army against the Turks armed only with a crucifix.

Lawrence was born into a family of Venetian merchants and was sent to Venice to be educated. He joined the Capuchin order in Verona when he was 16 and received tuition in theology, philosophy and foreign languages from the University of Padua. In addition to his native Italian, he had complete reading and speaking ability in Latin, Hebrew, Greek, German, Bohemian, Spanish, and French.

Pope Clement VIII gave Lawrence the task of converting Jews living in Rome to Catholicism because of his excellent command of Hebrew. Lawrence also established Capuchin monasteries in Germany and Austria and brought many Protestants back to Catholicism.

While serving as the imperial chaplain to the Holy Roman Emperor, Rudolph II, he led an army against the Ottoman Turks threatening to conquer Hungary armed only with a crucifix and many people attributed the subsequent victory to his leadership. He was later sent to be papal nuncio to Bavaria and then to Spain. Lawrence eventually retired to live in a monastery in Spain but was recalled to be a special envoy to the King of Spain in order to intercede on behalf of the rulers of the Kingdom of Naples.

His mission, made in the sweltering summer heat, exhausted him and he died on his 60th birthday in 1619, in Lisbon.

Lawrence was beatified in 1783 by Pope Pius VI and canonized in 1881 by Pope Leo XIII. He was declared a doctor of the Church by Pope John XXIII in 1959.
