Readings for Third Sunday of Easter

1st Reading: Acts of the Apostles 5:27-32, 40b-41 The Sanhedrin is not finished with those who persist in proclaiming the name of Jesus.

Psalm 30:2, 4, 5-6, 11-13 The mourning of the world turns into dancing when God rescues those in need.
2nd Reading: Revelation 5:11-14 Creatures in heaven and on Earth declare the glory and might of our God.

Gospel: Revelation 5:11-14 Creatures in heaven and on Earth declare the glory and might of our God. FOCUS: *My Lord and my God!*

When we receive the Eucharist, the body, blood, soul, and divinity of Jesus are substantially present, yet disguised under the appearance of bread and wine. As with Thomas, the Lord gives us the ability to see and believe in him. A good prayer for the moments of consecration, then, is the confession of faith that Thomas makes: *My Lord and my God!*

We understand that there is a Gospel call toward forgiveness — yet forgiveness is virtue connected to love and a creative act of possibility and grace.

Together, we can work to dispel common myths about forgiveness and open up new possibilities for reconciliation and healing.

Myth #1: Forgiveness means forgetting the past.

In our forgiveness journeys, we cannot and should not forget the history of violence and harm. Rather, we must learn to let go of the anger and hatred that feeds the cycle of violence. This release of negative emotions through forgiveness allows us to build, in the words of Pope Francis, "a shared hope stronger than the desire for vengeance" (*Fratelli Tutti*, 226).

Myth #2: Forgiveness is incompatible with justice.

On the contrary, justice and forgiveness are intimately linked. When someone forgives, they do not give up their right to seek justice.

In <u>Dives In Misericordia</u>, St. John Paul II says that without the presence of merciful love, justice gets distorted into revenge. (Think: "An eye for an eye.") The end goal of mercy is true justice, which addresses harm while also affirming the human dignity of all persons impacted. To Pope Francis, mercy and justice are two dimensions of a single reality, working together towards the fullness of God's love. "God's justice," Francis writes, "is his mercy given to everyone as a grace that flows from the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ" <u>(Misericordiae</u> *Vultus*, 21).

"Forgiveness is precisely what enables us to pursue justice without falling into a spiral of revenge or the injustice of forgetting" (*Fratelli Tutti*, 252).

Myth #3: Forgiveness is weak.

Experientially, we know that forgiveness is challenging and can require inner strength and external support. St. Thomas Aquinas speaks of God's mercy as a sign of his strength: "It is proper to God to exercise mercy, and he manifests his omnipotence particularly in this way" (*Summa Theologiae*). An ancient collect of the Mass offers a similar insight: "O God, who reveal your power above all in your mercy and forgiveness. . ." (*Misericordiae Vultus*, 6).

Pope Francis states that forgiveness "shows its strength by refusing to take revenge" (*Fratelli Tutti, 243*).

The vulnerability that love and mercy require is a sign of strength. Vulnerability is not weakness or an unwanted deficit of power, but a freely chosen stance of trust and love.

Myth #4: Forgiveness demeans victims of harm or negates the harm done to them.

Forgiveness is compatible with seeking justice for the survivors of wrongdoing and does not negate their pain and suffering. Forgiveness is not demeaning but a free choice by the survivor, through which survivors reclaim personal agency and redefine their relationship to the past.

As Pope Francis explains, "Free and heartfelt forgiveness is something noble, a reflection of God's own infinite ability to forgive. . . Those who truly forgive do not forget. . . They break the vicious circle; they halt the advance of the forces of destruction." (*Fratelli Tutti*, 250-251)

Myth #5: Forgiveness cannot happen unless the perpetrator repents. The truth is that, as an act of freedom and renewed personal agency, survivors can and do forgive without regard to the attitudes of the wrongdoer. It is possible for survivors to let go of their anger, to envision and create a future not controlled by the past, without first reconciling with the perpetrator of the harm they suffered.

Consider the words of St. Paul: "But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8). In the salvific plan of God, love precedes repentance. People must know their innate dignity as children of God, prior to being called to transformation.

Love, including in the form of forgiveness, has a transformative power which can help move people who have caused harm to repentance.



Entendemos que hay un llamado del Evangelio al perdón; sin embargo, el perdón es una virtud conectada con el amor y un acto creativo de posibilidad y gracia.

Juntos, podemos trabajar para disipar mitos comunes sobre el perdón y abrir nuevas posibilidades para la reconciliación y la sanación.

Mito #1: Perdonar significa olvidar el pasado.

En nuestros viajes de perdón, no podemos ni debemos olvidar la historia de violencia y daño. Más bien, debemos aprender a dejar ir la ira y el odio que alimentan el ciclo de violencia. Esta liberación de emociones negativas a través del perdón nos permite construir, en palabras del Papa Francisco, "una esperanza compartida más fuerte que el deseo de venganza" (Fratelli Tutti, 226).

Mito #2: El perdón es incompatible con la justicia.

Por el contrario, la justicia y el perdón están íntimamente ligados. Cuando alguien perdona, no renuncia a su derecho a buscar justicia. En Dives In Misericordia, San Juan Pablo II dice que sin la presencia del amor misericordioso, la justicia se distorsiona en venganza. (Piense: "Ojo por ojo"). El objetivo final de la misericordia es la verdadera justicia, que aborda el daño y al mismo tiempo afirma la dignidad humana de todas las personas afectadas.

Para el Papa Francisco, la misericordia y la justicia son dos dimensiones de una misma realidad, trabajando juntas hacia la plenitud del amor de Dios. "La justicia de Dios", escribe Francisco, "es su misericordia dada a todos como una gracia que brota de la muerte y resurrección de Jesucristo" (Misericordiae Vultus, 21).

"El perdón es precisamente lo que nos permite buscar la justicia sin caer en la espiral de la venganza o en la injusticia del olvido" (Fratelli Tutti, 252).

Mito #3: El perdón es débil.

Por experiencia, sabemos que el perdón es un desafío y puede requerir fuerza interior y apoyo externo. Santo Tomás de Aquino habla de la misericordia de Dios como signo de su fuerza: "Es propio de Dios ejercer la misericordia, y manifestar su omnipotencia particularmente de esta manera" (Summa Theologiae).

Una antigua oración colecta de la Misa ofrece una visión similar: "Oh Dios, que revelas tu poder sobre todo en tu misericordia y perdón. . ." (Misericordiae Vultus, 6).

El Papa Francisco afirma que el perdón "muestra su fuerza al negarse a vengarse" (Fratelli Tutti, 243).

La vulnerabilidad que exigen el amor y la misericordia es signo de fortaleza. La vulnerabilidad no es debilidad o un déficit de poder no deseado, sino una postura de confianza y amor libremente elegida.

Mito #4: El perdón degrada a las víctimas del daño o niega el daño que se les ha hecho.

El perdón es compatible con la búsqueda de justicia para los sobrevivientes del mal y no niega su dolor y sufrimiento. El perdón no es degradante sino una elección libre del sobreviviente, a través del cual los sobrevivientes recuperan su agencia personal y redefinen su relación con el pasado.

Como explica el Papa Francisco, "El perdón gratuito y sincero es algo noble, un reflejo de la capacidad infinita de Dios para perdonar. . . Quien perdona de verdad no olvida. . . Rompen el círculo vicioso; detiene el avance de las fuerzas de destrucción." (Fratelli Tutti, 250-251)

Mito #5: El perdón no puede ocurrir a menos que el perpetrador se arrepienta.

La verdad es que, como un acto de libertad y agencia personal renovada, los sobrevivientes pueden perdonar y lo hacen sin tener en cuenta las actitudes del malhechor. Es posible que los sobrevivientes dejen ir su ira, visualicen y hagan un futuro no controlado por el pasado, sin antes reconciliarse con el perpetrador del daño que sufrieron.

Considera las palabras de San Pablo: "Pero Dios demuestra su amor por nosotros en esto: en que siendo aún pecadores, Cristo murió por nosotros" (Romanos 5:8).

En el plan salvífico de Dios, el amor precede al arrepentimiento. Las personas deben conocer su dignidad innata como hijos de Dios, antes de ser llamados a la transformación.

El amor, incluso en forma de perdón, tiene un poder transformador que puede ayudar a mover al arrepentimiento a las personas que han causado daño.


