May is the month of Mary. Mary is the Daughter of God the Father, the Mother of God the Son and the Mystical Spouse of the Holy Spirit, the Queen of the angels, saints, of heaven and earth. And St. Louis de Montfort acclaims her as the Queen of all hearts and God's masterpiece of creation. The saints' acclaim in powerful, inspired and often poetic terms the glories of the Blessed Virgin Mary. What might be some ways that we can manifest our love and devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary in her month, the month of Mary?

1. Consecration-

The first gesture we should do every morning is prayer — a prayer of consecration to Jesus through the Immaculate heart of Mary. Start off the day right through Mary! St. Mother Teresa, moved by great love for Mary said: "Mary, give me your heart: so beautiful, so pure so immaculate; your Heart so full of love and humility that I May be able to receive Jesus in the Bread of Life and love Him as you love Him and serve Him in the distressing guise of the poor."

2. Angelus/Regina Caeli-

Traditionally this prayer is prayed at noon, but it can be prayed at any time. Why not pray it three times a day — at 9:00 am, 12 noon, and 6:00 pm. By doing this we will be sanctifying the morning hours, the afternoon hours, and the evening hours through the holy and sweet presence of Mary. These Marian prayers call to mind Mary's key presence in the Mysteries of our salvation. St. John Vianney reminds us of the constant presence and action of Mary in our lives: "*Only after the Last Judgment will Mary get any rest; from now until then, she is too busy with her children. To serve the Queen of Heaven is to reign there, and to live under her commands is more than to govern.*"

3. Imitate Mary-

If we truly love somebody, then we want to get to know them better, follow them more closely and finally to imitate their good qualities that we call virtues. St. Louis de Montfort in his classic *True Devotion to Mary*, gives us a list of the ten principal virtues of Mary. Imitate them and you will be on the Highway to holiness. Here they are: Her deep humility, lively faith, blind obedience, unceasing prayer, constant self-denial, surpassing purity, ardent love, heroic patience, angelic kindness, and heavenly wisdom!

St. Louis teaches us: "*The greatest saints, those richest in grace and virtue will be the most assiduous in praying to the most Blessed Virgin, looking up to her as the perfect model to imitate and as a powerful helper to assist them.*"

4. Temptations? Call on Mary!

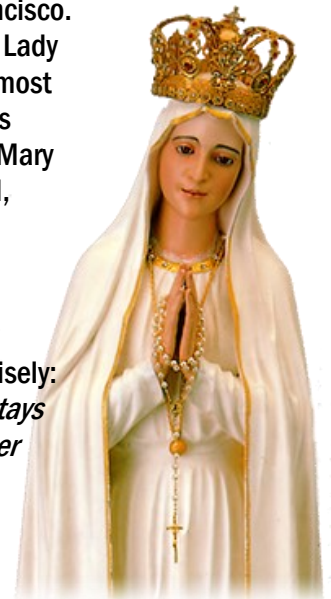
Our life is a constant combat zone, until death! We should not fight alone against the devil, the flesh and the world. Rather, in the heat of temptation, when all seems to be lost call upon the Holy Name of Mary; pray the Hail Mary! If done, all the powers of hell will be vanquished. Mary is the "General in the army". At her command the enemies—the evil spirits—take to flight, vanish, and are defeated! St. Francis de Sales was tempted to despair and through the prayer to Mary, "*Memorare*" (attributed to St. Bernard) the temptation was conquered.

St. Anthony Mary Claret was tempted fiercely to give in to a temptation against purity. It was through his fervent prayers to Mary that the devil of impurity was expelled and young Anthony was given special graces to live chastity, to found a Religious Order, preach constantly and write many books that did immense good. As St. Bonaventure asserts: "*Men do not fear a powerful hostile army as the powers of hell fear the name and protection of Mary.*"

5. The Most Holy Rosary!

In Fatima Our Lady appeared six times to the Shepherd children—Lucia, Jacinta and Francisco. In each and every apparition Our Lady insisted upon the praying of the most Holy Rosary. St. John Paul II in his document on the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Rosary insisted, pleaded, that the whole world pray the Holy Rosary for the salvation of the family and for world peace.

Father Patrick Peyton put it concisely: "*The family that prays together stays together*"... and "*A world at prayer is a world at peace.*"





During the month of May, we pay special honor to our Blessed Mother. In 1965, Pope Paul VI wrote a short encyclical on the month of May. He wrote that May is an occasion for a *“moving tribute of faith and love which Catholics in every part of the world pay to the Queen of Heaven. In this month, too, the benefits of God’s mercy come down to us from her throne in greater abundance.”*

Below is a Morning Offering prayer to give all the trials and joys that may come to your day, to the intercession of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, that she may take them and purify them as a worthy offering, and present it to the Sacred Heart of her Son.

MORNING OFFERING TO THE IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY

O Jesus, through the Immaculate Heart of Mary,

I offer you my prayers, works, joys, and sufferings of this day,

for all the intentions of your Sacred Heart,

in union with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass throughout the world,

for the salvation of souls, the reparation of sins, the reunion of all

Christians, and in particular for the intentions of

the Holy Father this month.

Mayo es el mes de María. María es la Hija de Dios Padre, la Madre de Dios Hijo y la Esposa Mística del Espíritu Santo, la Reina de los ángeles, los santos, del cielo y de la tierra. Y San Luis de Montfort la aclama como la Reina de todos los corazones y la obra maestra de la creación de Dios. Los santos aclaman en términos poderosos, inspirados y a menudo poéticos las glorias de la Santísima Virgen María. ¿Cuáles podrían ser algunas formas en que podemos manifestar nuestro amor y devoción a la Santísima Virgen María en su mes; el mes de María?

1. Consagración- El primer gesto que debemos hacer cada mañana es la oración, una oración de consagración a Jesús a través del Inmaculado Corazón de María. ¡Empieza bien el día a través de Mary! Santa Madre Teresa movida por un gran amor a María dijo: “María, dame tu corazón: tan hermoso, tan puro tan inmaculado; tu Corazón tan lleno de amor y humildad que Yo pueda recibir a Jesús en el Pan de Vida y amarlo como tú lo amas y lo sirves en el angustioso disfraz de los pobres”.

2. Angelus/Regina Caeli- Tradicionalmente esta oración se reza al mediodía, pero se rezaba en cualquier momento. ¿Por qué no rezarlo tres veces al día, a las 9:00 am, 12:00 pm y 6:00 pm? Al hacer esto estaremos santificando las horas de la mañana, las horas de la tarde y las horas de la noche a través de la santa y dulce presencia de María. Estas oraciones marianas recuerdan la presencia clave de María en los Misterios de nuestra salvación, San Juan Vianney nos recuerda la constante presencia y acción de María en nuestras vidas: “Solo después del Juicio Final María descansará; desde ahora hasta entonces, ella está demasiado ocupada con sus hijos. Servir a la Reina del Cielo es reinar allí, y vivir bajo sus órdenes es más que gobernar”.

3. Imitar a María- Si amamos verdaderamente a alguien, entonces queremos conocerlo mejor, seguirlo más de cerca y finalmente imitar sus buenas cualidades que llamamos virtudes. San Luis de Montfort en su clásico *La Verdadera Devoción a María* nos da una lista de las diez principales virtudes de María. Imítalos y estarás en el Camino a la santidad. Aquí están: Su profunda humildad, Fe viva, Obediencia ciega, Oración incesante, Abnegación constante,

Pureza insuperable, Amor ardiente, Paciencia heroica, Angelical bondad, y sabiduría celestial!

San Luis nos enseña: “Los más grandes santos, los más ricos en gracia y virtud, serán los más asiduos en la oración a la Santísima Virgen, mirándola como modelo perfecto a imitar y como poderosa ayuda para asistirlos”.

4. ¿Tentaciones? ¡Llama a María! Nuestra vida es una zona de combate constante, ¡hasta la muerte! No debemos luchar solos contra el diablo, la carne y el mundo. Más bien, en el calor de la tentación, cuando todo parece estar perdido, invoquen el Santo Nombre de María; ¡Reza el Ave María! Si se hace, todos los poderes del infierno serán vencidos. María es la “General en el ejército”. ¡A sus órdenes, los enemigos, los espíritus malignos, se dan a la fuga, se desvanecen y son derrotados! San Francisco de Sales fue tentado a la desesperación ya través de la oración a María, “Memorare” (atribuida a San Bernardo) la tentación fue vencida.

San Antonio María Claret fue fuertemente tentado a ceder a una tentación contra la pureza. Fue a través de sus fervientes oraciones a María que el demonio de la impureza fue expulsado y el joven Antonio recibió gracias especiales para vivir la castidad, fundar una Orden Religiosa, predicar constantemente y escribir muchos libros que hicieron un bien inmenso. Como afirma San Buenaventura: “Los hombres no temen a un poderoso ejército hostil como los poderes del infierno temen el nombre y la protección de María”.

5. ¡El Santísimo Rosario! En Fátima, Nuestra Señora se apareció seis veces a los niños pastores: Lucía, Jacinta y Francisco. En todas y cada una de las apariciones Nuestra Señora insistió en el rezo del Santísimo Rosario. San Juan Pablo II en su documento sobre la Santísima Virgen María y el Rosario insistió, suplicó, que el mundo entero rezara el Santo Rosario por la salvación de la familia y por la paz mundial.

El padre Patrick Peyton lo expresó de manera concisa: "La familia que ora unida, permanece unida" ... y "Un mundo en oración es un mundo en paz".

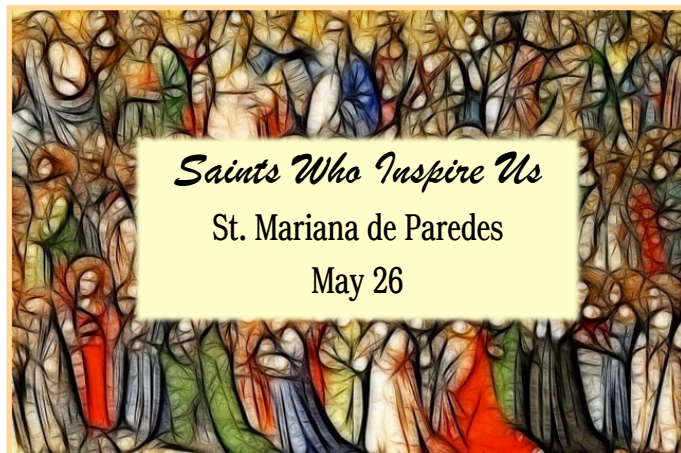

Saints Who Inspire Us

St. Mariana de Paredes

May 26

At the age of ten, Mariana took the evangelical councils of poverty, chastity, and obedience, hoping to become a religious or a missionary. Becoming a recluse in her own home, most days she ate nothing; when she did eat, it was usually just a few morsels of dry bread every eight or ten days. Indeed, her body seemed to be miraculously sustained on Holy Communion. Perhaps all of Mariana's spiritual gifts would have remained a secret but for her ultimate sacrifice. In the year 1646, the city of Quito, capital of Ecuador, was being ravaged by many scourges on account of the sins of its Catholic population. Volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, and terrible diseases were decimating the population. She asked Our Lord to accept her offering "in defense of her country, her compatriots, and her kindred" and that she "might be chastised for the sins of the city." She was immediately struck with a mortal illness to which she succumbed within two months. During her final suffering the earthquakes stopped, the volcano quieted, and the plagues died out. All of Quito prayed for Mariana's recovery, realizing what a great sacrifice she had made for them. God accepted their prayers as repentance, but Mariana's soul was taken to paradise to be with her Beloved forever on Ascension Thursday, May 26, 1645. When she breathed her last, her body fell over on the dirt floor, and on that very spot a white lily sprang forth from the earth that had received some of the blood that was still moist on her garments. This is why she is known as the Lily of Quito.
