# ...Fr. David Regan

It was to God's plan of salvation that Mary was created without original sin. Adam and Eve represented all of the human family and all of humanity fell with them. Original sin was passed on to their children and to their children's children. When we are conceived, we are born into a natural separation from God called original sin and with an inclination toward sin.

God's plan was to have His only Son, the second Person of the Trinity, assume a human nature so that as both God and man Jesus could accomplish the redemption of humanity. One problem arises: God is all-holy. Therefore, He is in complete and total opposition to sin. Sinners can't come into His presence without being purified. How would God the Son be able to intimately join Himself with a fallen nature? This is where God's plan for Mary comes in. God chose her to be conceived without original sin so that she would be able to give Jesus a pure and sinless nature. Mary is the pure and stainless vessel through which Jesus receives a sinless and immaculate nature so that He can enter the world to complete the Father's plan of salvation.

"I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; He will strike at your head, while you strike at his heel." (Gen 3:15)

It is important that we identify who God is addressing. God is speaking to the serpent, and He says that the offspring of the woman will strike at his head. Who is the one who will strike at the head of the serpent? *Jesus* is the one who will come, strike at Satan's head, and destroy his power. So, if the offspring of the woman is Jesus, then the woman must be Mary.

God speaks of *enmity* between the serpent and the woman, and between the serpent's offspring and the woman's offspring. The offspring of Satan is sin, with which Satan desires to multiply and fill the earth. Therefore, there is enmity between Mary/Jesus and Satan/sin. *Enmity means total and complete opposition*. Both Jesus and Mary are completely opposed to Satan and sin. They would have absolutely no cooperation or communion with Satan and sin.

It was necessary that Mary not have a fallen nature since any participation in original sin or actual sin would destroy the enmity with Satan and sin. We see in the very first announcement of God's plan of salvation His intention to keep Mary totally free from sin so that Jesus would be able to assume a pure nature. We see even greater reference to the Immaculate Conception of

Mary in Luke's Gospel at the Annunciation. The angel Gabriel appears to Mary to announce God's plan for her to be the mother of Jesus. Gabriel's greeting to Mary reveals her immaculate state. His greeting properly translated is "Hail, you who have been filled with grace." (Luke 1:28) The Greek word kekaritomene is a perfect participle, "have been filled." Mary has already been filled with God's grace, for grace has already been infused into her at the moment of her conception. The angel's greeting reveals another truth about Mary. Anytime someone sins, even the smallest sin, the person loses at least some of God's grace. That is the nature of sin: a choice a person makes that rejects the grace He offers to us, which is His very life and love. If Mary is filled with grace, then she would have been completely free from sin, because any sin, even the tiniest. would have caused her to be deprived of at least some grace. Pope Pius IX stated that she was preserved from sin "by a singular grace and privilege of the Omnipotent God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ."

Mary needed Christ to redeem her just as much as we all do. She was redeemed by her Son's death on the Cross just like all of us. But how could Mary have been redeemed by Jesus' death on the Cross before Jesus was even born?

God is not bound by either space or time. He sees all of time—past, present, and future—at once. Therefore, He took the graces and merits of Jesus' death on the Cross and applied them back in time to the moment of Mary's conception. Mary was redeemed by Christ as we all are, but through a "singular (special) grace..." she was also completely preserved from original sin. The important distinction, however, is that Mary was redeemed but also preserved from sin. She never had sin, even for a second. From the very moment of her existence, Mary was completely *preserved* from sin and thus never knew or cooperated with sin her entire life.

Even though Mary was preserved from original sin at the moment of her conception, she could have still chosen to sin since she had free will. She could have still rejected God's grace and His plan and fallen into sin. She could have said no to the Father at the Annunciation. She could have said no to the Father at the foot of the Cross where she surrendered her Son. She could have fallen into despair and cursed God. Rather, Mary perfectly cooperated and surrendered herself to the great gift of grace that God had given her and lived the most extraordinary Christian life. This is why Mary is the model of faith and the model of the Church.

Fue para el plan de salvación de Dios que María fue creada sin pecado original. Adán y Eva representaron a toda la familia humana y toda la humanidad cayó con ellos. El pecado original se transmitió a sus hijos y a los hijos de sus hijos. Cuando somos concebidos, nacemos en una separación natural de Dios llamada pecado original y con una inclinación hacia el pecado.

El plan de Dios era que Su único Hijo, la segunda Persona de la Trinidad, asumiera una naturaleza humana para que, como Dios y como hombre, Jesús pudiera lograr la redención de la humanidad. Surge un problema: Dios es todo santo. Por lo tanto, Él está en completa y total oposición al pecado. Los pecadores no pueden venir a Su presencia sin ser purificados. ¿Cómo podría Dios el Hijo unirse íntimamente a Sí mismo con una naturaleza caída? Aquí es donde entra el plan de Dios para María. Dios la eligió para que fuera concebida sin pecado original para que pudiera dar a Jesús una naturaleza pura y sin pecado. María es la vasija pura e inmaculada a través de la cual Jesús recibe una naturaleza inmaculada y sin pecado para que pueda entrar en el mundo y completar el plan de salvación del Padre.

Enemistad pondré entre ti y la mujer, y entre tu descendencia y la de ella; él te herirá en la cabeza, mientras tú le hieres en el calcañar. (Génesis 3:15)

Es importante que identifiquemos a quién se dirige Dios. Dios le está hablando a la serpiente, y dice que la descendencia de la mujer le herirá en la cabeza. ¿Quién es el que herirá la cabeza de la serpiente? Jesús es el que vendrá, golpeará la cabeza de Satanás y destruirá su poder. Entonces, si el hijo de la mujer es Jesús, entonces la mujer debe ser María.

Dios habla de enemistad entre la serpiente y la mujer, y entre la descendencia de la serpiente y la descendencia de la mujer. La descendencia de Satanás es el pecado, con el cual Satanás desea multiplicarse y llenar la tierra. Por lo tanto, hay enemistad entre María/Jesús y Satanás/pecado. Enemistad significa oposición total y completa. Tanto Jesús como María se oponen por completo a Satanás y al pecado. No tendrían absolutamente ninguna cooperación o comunión con Satanás y el pecado.

Era necesario que María no tuviera una naturaleza caída ya que cualquier participación en el pecado original o en el pecado actual destruiría la enemistad con Satanás y el pecado. Vemos en el primer anuncio del plan de salvación de Dios Su intención de mantener a María totalmente libre de pecado para que Jesús pueda asumir una naturaleza pura.

Vemos una referencia aún mayor a la Inmaculada Concepción de María en el Evangelio de Lucas en la Anunciación. El ángel Gabriel se le aparece a María para anunciarle el plan de Dios para que ella sea la madre de Jesús. El saludo de Gabriel a María revela su estado inmaculado. Su saludo correctamente traducido es "Salve, tú que has sido lleno de gracia". (Lucas 1:28.) La palabra griega kekaritomene es un participio perfecto, "han sido llenos". María ya ha sido colmada de la gracia de Dios, porque la gracia ya le ha sido infundida en el momento de su concepción.

El saludo del ángel revela otra verdad sobre María. Cada vez que alguien peca, incluso el pecado más pequeño, la persona pierde al menos algo de la gracia de Dios. Esa es la naturaleza del pecado: una elección que hace una persona que rechaza la gracia que Él nos ofrece, que es Su misma vida y amor. Si María está llena de gracia, entonces habría estado completamente libre de pecado, porque cualquier pecado, incluso el más pequeño, la habría privado de al menos alguna gracia. El Papa Pío IX declaró que ella fue preservada del pecado "por una singular gracia y privilegio del Dios Omnipotente, en vista de los méritos de Jesucristo".

María necesitaba a Cristo para redimirla tanto como todos nosotros. Ella fue redimida por la muerte de su Hijo en la Cruz como todos nosotros. Pero, ¿cómo pudo María haber sido redimida por la muerte de Jesús en la Cruz antes de que Jesús naciera? Dios no está limitado ni por el espacio ni por el tiempo. Ve todo el tiempo, pasado, presente y futuro, a la vez. Por lo tanto, tomó las gracias y los méritos de la muerte de Jesús en la Cruz y los aplicó en el tiempo hasta el momento de la concepción de María. María fue redimida por Cristo como lo somos todos, pero por una "gracia singular (especial)..." también fue preservada completamente del pecado original. La distinción importante, sin embargo, es que María fue redimida pero también preservada del pecado. Ella nunca tuvo pecado, ni por un segundo. Desde el mismo momento de su existencia, María fue completamente preservada del pecado y, por lo tanto, nunca conoció ni cooperó con el pecado en toda su vida.

A pesar de que María fue preservada del pecado original en el momento de su concepción, aún pudo haber elegido pecar ya que tenía libre albedrío. Todavía podría haber rechazado la gracia de Dios y Su plan y haber caído en el pecado. Podría haber dicho no al Padre en la Anunciación. Ella pudo haber dicho no al Padre al pie de la Cruz donde entregó a su Hijo. Podría haberse desesperado y haber maldecido a Dios. Más bien, María cooperó perfectamente y se entregó al gran don de la gracia que Dios le había dado y vivió la vida cristiana más extraordinaria. Por eso María es el modelo de la fe y el modelo de la Iglesia.

The first Sunday of Advent gives us the opportunity to center our thoughts on hope. As we prepare our hearts to celebrate Jesus' arrival as a gift to all humanity; let's stir up in our hearts and homes a sense of anticipation. Over this Advent, we pray that hope would rise up in our spirits in a tangible and life-giving way.

Advent marks the start of a season of preparation that looks forward to the celebration of Christmas and the second coming of Christ. It is a time of reflection in preparing our hearts for the coming of Christ—we remember how our Savior humbled Himself to be born as a baby and live among those He would save. We remember the perfect life He lived doing the will of His Father, His sacrificial death on the cross, and how He was raised from the dead three days later, having paid the penalty to save all who would believe. Christians remember Jesus' promise to return again one day and restore everything fully. This season invokes feelings of expectation and hope! The word Advent comes from the Latin adventus, meaning "arrival" or "coming" from the word advenire. Advent is a reminder of how the Jewish people waited for the Messiah and how Christians wait for the second coming of Christ today.



"The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned. [...]For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the greatness of his government and peace there will be no end. He will reign on David's throne and over his kingdom, establishing and upholding it with justice and righteousness from that time on and forever. The zeal of the Lord Almighty will accomplish this." -Isaiah 9:2; Isaiah 9:6-7

The tradition for the first Sunday of Advent includes lighting the candle of hope. This candle of hope symbolizes promises delivered through the prophets from God as well as the hope we have in Christ. God crafted a great rescue plan that he lays out in Scripture. This plan foretells years in advance the arrival of Christ. The Bible also gives us a glimpse of the future and promises that God will come down to create a new heaven and Earth.


