The Church has long taught the importance of this Advent, intended to be penitential but joyful time. **Advent in the Catechism** - *"Then the dragon was angry with the woman, and went off to make war on the rest of her offspring." Therefore the Spirit and the Church pray: "Come, Lord Jesus," since his coming will deliver us from the Evil One (CCC 2853).*

The Catechism prefaces its section about Jesus's incarnation with an explanation of Mary's importance in salvation history (CCC 484-511). As the quote above demonstrates, Mary makes Satan furious by bringing the Christ child into the world. This woman, who would challenge the Prince of Darkness by her cooperation with salvation, needed to be a strong woman. Advent is an opportunity to reflect on Mary in this light. Starting at CCC 502, the Catechism provides a powerful reflection on Christ's identity as revealed through Mary's virginity. It breaks down five important truths that follow from the teaching of Mary's virginal conception of Christ. This virginal conception:

- 1. Makes God the "absolute" initiator of the Incarnation (503)
- 2. Establishes Jesus as the New Adam (made from nothing by God's power, 504)
- 3. Begins the welcoming of children of the New Covenant, adopted by the Holy Spirit (505)
- 4. Proves Mary's perfect, doubt-free faith (506)

"At once virgin and mother" Mary is the perfect symbol of the Church, who is pure in her faithfulness to her spouse in Christ, but also the mother of the children of God (507)

These truths serve as Advent commentary on the journey of God's people prior to the birth of Jesus. It also captures the long wait of the Jews for their Messiah. As the Catechism states: When the Church celebrates the liturgy of Advent each year, she makes present this ancient expectancy of the Messiah, for by sharing in the long preparation for the Savior's first coming, the faithful renew their ardent desire for his second coming (CCC 524). Finally, it helps the faithful remember their need to humble themselves before their Savior, who humbled Himself for us. "By celebrating the precursor's birth and martyrdom, the Church unites herself to his desire: 'He must increase, but I must decrease'" (CCC 524).

Advent in the Liturgical Calendar- The Church's liturgical calendar invites us into this reflection on Mary and Jesus by

placing Marian feasts throughout the season. The Immaculate Conception is observed early in Advent and throughout the entire month. Later, the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe is welcomed with a burst of roses in the church. There is also the Feast of Our Lady of Loreto, prompting us to consider the Holy Family's home life.

The positioning of Advent at the beginning of the liturgical calendar and at the end of the secular one is significant. It invites us to view the season as a time for reflection, renewal, and recommitment to better lives and habits for the year ahead of us. Advent encourages us to view the approaching calendar year with our spiritual aspirations already in mind and heart. This should help us shape the remainder of our life's goals for the new year around our already determined spiritual commitments.

Advent in Name and Meaning- Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI has written extensively about Christ's infancy and the specialness of this time of year. In this particular homily, he explores the way the word itself reveals the purpose of the season: *"The essential meaning of the word adventus was: God is here, he has not withdrawn from the world, he has not deserted us. Even if we cannot see and touch him as we can tangible realities, he is here and comes to visit us in many ways."*

Advent means "coming" and Pope Benedict reflects on how Christ's coming gives us the opportunity to consider Him in each little moment of our lives. Advent provides the basis for hope: we know our Lord is here for us, that He came for us, so we can structure our days in light of this happy fact. He says that, unlike other parts of human life that prompt a hope that can end without fulfillment or leave nothing else to hope for afterward, Christ provides a constant light ahead in the Christian life: *Hope marks humanity's journey but for Christians it is enlivened by a certainty: the Lord is present in the passage of our lives, he accompanies us and will one day also dry our tears. One day, not far off, everything will find its fulfilment in the Kingdom of God, a Kingdom of justice and peace.*

Let us honor the Church's intention for this Advent season and make time to observe it. The doors were all closed to Christ but He still came for us, so we must show up for Him. May we all keep this hope present even in these difficult times.

La Iglesia ha enseñado durante mucho tiempo la importancia de este Adviento, destinado a ser un tiempo penitencial pero gozoso. Adviento en el Catecismo: *"Entonces el dragón se enojó con la mujer, y se fue a hacer la guerra contra el resto de su descendencia." Por eso el Espíritu y la Iglesia oran: "Ven, Señor Jesús", ya que su venida nos librará del Maligno (CIC 2853).*

El Catecismo inicia su sección sobre la encarnación de Jesús con una explicación de la importancia de María en la historia de la salvación (CIC 484-511). Como demuestra la cita anterior, María enfurece a Satanás al traer al niño Jesús al mundo. Esta mujer, que desafiaría al Príncipe de las Tinieblas por su cooperación con la salvación, necesitaba ser una mujer fuerte. El Adviento es una oportunidad para reflexionar sobre María bajo esta luz.

Comenzando en CIC 502, el Catecismo proporciona una poderosa reflexión sobre la identidad de Cristo revelada a través de la virginidad de María. Desglosa cinco verdades importantes que se derivan de la enseñanza de la concepción virginal de María de Cristo. Esta concepción virginal:

- 1. Hace de Dios el iniciador "absoluto" de la Encarnación (503)
- 2. Establece a Jesús como el Nuevo Adán (hecho de la nada por el poder de Dios, 504)
- 3. Comienza la acogida de los hijos de la Nueva Alianza, adoptados por el Espíritu Santo (505)
- 4. Prueba la fe perfecta y sin duda de María (506)

5. "A la vez virgen y madre" María es el símbolo perfecto de la Iglesia, pura en su fidelidad a su esposo en Cristo, pero también madre de los hijos de Dios (507)

Estas verdades sirven como comentario de Adviento sobre la jornada del pueblo de Dios antes del nacimiento de Jesús. También captura la larga espera de los judíos por su Mesías. Como dice el Catecismo: *"Cuando la Iglesia celebra cada año la liturgia de Adviento, hace presente esta antigua espera del Mesías, pues al participar en la larga preparación de la primera venida del Salvador, los fieles renuevan su ardiente deseo de su segunda venida (CIC 524).*


Finalmente, ayuda a los fieles a recordar su necesidad de humillarse ante su Salvador, quien se humilló a sí mismo por nosotros. "Al celebrar el nacimiento y el martirio del precursor, la Iglesia se une a su deseo: 'Él debe crecer, pero yo debo disminuir'" (CIC 524).

Adviento en el Calendario Litúrgico: El calendario litúrgico de la Iglesia nos invita a esta reflexión sobre María y Jesús colocando las fiestas marianas a lo largo de la temporada. La Inmaculada Concepción se observa a principios de Adviento y durante todo el mes. Posteriormente, se da la bienvenida a la Fiesta de Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe con un estallido de rosas en la iglesia. También está la fiesta de Nuestra Señora de Loreto, que nos impulsa a considerar la vida hogareña de la Sagrada Familia.

Es significativo el posicionamiento del Adviento al principio del calendario litúrgico y al final del secular. Nos invita a ver la temporada como un momento de reflexión, renovación y compromiso con mejores vidas y hábitos para el año que tenemos por delante. El Adviento nos anima a ver el próximo año calendario con nuestras aspiraciones espirituales ya en mente y corazón. Esto debería ayudarnos a dar forma al resto de las metas de nuestra vida para el nuevo año en torno a nuestros compromisos espirituales ya determinados.

Adviento en nombre y significado: el Papa Emérito Benedicto XVI ha escrito extensamente sobre la infancia de Cristo y lo especial de esta época del año. En esta homilía particular, explora la forma en que la palabra misma revela el propósito de la temporada: *"El significado esencial de la palabra adventus era: Dios está aquí, no se ha retirado del mundo, no nos ha abandonado. Incluso si no podemos verlo y tocarlo como podemos hacerlo con las realidades tangibles, él está aquí y viene a visitarnos de muchas maneras".* Adviento significa "venida" y el Papa Benedicto reflexiona sobre cómo la venida de Cristo nos da la oportunidad de considerarlo en cada pequeño momento de nuestra vida. El Adviento proporciona la base para la esperanza: sabemos que nuestro Señor está aquí por nosotros, que vino por nosotros, para que podamos estructurar nuestros días a la luz de este hecho feliz. Dice que, a diferencia de otras partes de la vida humana que suscitan una esperanza que puede terminar sin realizarse o no dejar nada más que esperar después, Cristo proporciona una luz constante en la vida cristiana: *la esperanza marca el camino de la humanidad, pero para los cristianos está animada por una certeza: el Señor está presente en el paso de nuestra vida, nos acompaña y un día secará también nuestras lágrimas. Un día, no lejano, todo encontrará su cumplimiento en el Reino de Dios, Reino de justicia y de paz.*

Honremos la intención de la Iglesia para este tiempo de Adviento y hagamos tiempo para observarla. Todas las puertas estaban cerradas para Cristo, pero aun así vino por nosotros, así que debemos presentarnos ante Él. Que todos mantengamos presente esta esperanza incluso en estos tiempos difíciles.

Get to know the Advent Saints

St. Ambrose of Milan-Dec. 7. For many years, Ambrose defended the faith of the Church and spread the Gospel. God had called him to do many things for the Church. Ambrose wrote hymns in a new way and these songs influenced other Christian songwriters. Ambrose also spoke out against anyone who did not follow the Gospels. Once the emperor put 7,000 people to death because one person killed a Roman governor. Ambrose made the emperor do public penance for his sin.

St. Juan Diego-Dec. 9. In 1531, the Virgin Mary appeared to Juan as he passed Tepevac Hill. She said that she wanted a church to be built on that site. Juan needed proof to bring to the bishop. On the snow-covered hill, Juan found beautiful roses, a kind that did not grow in Mexico. Juan filled his cloak with the flowers and ran to see the bishop. When he opened his cloak the flowers fell to the floor. To their amazement, an image of the Lady was imprinted inside Juan's cloak. Soon after, the bishop had a church built on the site where the Virgin Mary first appeared to Juan.



The second Sunday of Advent gives us the opportunity to prepare our hearts in faithful waiting, celebrate the birth of Jesus, and ready ourselves for his second coming. It's a beautiful chance to reflect on the ways prophecy has been fulfilled and to ponder what the future (promised to us through prophecies) will bring.

Advent is a four-week period of prayer and preparation, and of looking forward to the coming of the Lord Jesus among us. We are filled with joy and love in the Lord, and compelled to share these with others. As we open our hearts in prayer during Advent, we pray that the "Good News" of Jesus is heard throughout the world so that hearts will turn to love and peace.

While Lent is fundamentally considered a time for repentance, Advent also offers the opportunity for renewal. God invites us to let Jesus come into our hearts so that we can be more like Him. It is a season of quiet expectation. We live in the expectation of the fullness of joy to come. We strive to know and obey God's will for us. We set out to love God each day and to live out our baptismal call by loving and serving others. This is the way Jesus wants us to make a straight way for Him in our hearts as we await His coming.



The Second Advent candle is frequently called the Peace candle or the Bethlehem candle. It symbolizes the preparations being made to receive and cradle the Christ child. Bethlehem is a story about a humble couple on an unwanted journey, at an inconvenient time, to visit a tiny insignificant town just outside of Jerusalem. Yet God did not choose Jerusalem for the birthplace of the Messiah. God loved the world so much that He chose, a tiny insignificant town as the location for the birth of the one who literally changed the world. This is the first of many reminders that God loves even the insignificant of the world. Jesus is our Peace! In the busyness of the season will you make room for Christ, or will you miss it? Do you think the Inn Keeper would have given up his room had he known who needed it?

Catholic Churches use the traditional colors of purple, pink and white for the Advent Wreath. The purple color signifies penance and it is also worn by the priest. The pink candle is used to represent rejoicing. Greek Orthodox Churches observe Advent for 40 days instead of 1 month. They use 6 different candles-green, blue, gold, white, purple and red. Lutheran Churches in the U.S. will typically either follow the same tradition of Catholic churches with the traditional candle colors, or instead, 4 blue candles representing hope and expectation.


