Next Sunday's Liturgy—February 18

Readings for First Sunday of Lent

1st Reading: Genesis 9:8-15 God establishes the rainbow as a sign of the covenant with all living things.

Psalm 25:4-5, 6-7, 8-9 God guides and teaches those who are humble enough to accept instruction.

2nd Reading: 1 Peter 3:18-22 God waited patiently for Noah to build the ark of his salvation.

Gospel: Mark 1:12-15 After the trial in the desert, Jesus proclaims repentance and the Kingdom coming.

FOCUS: Repent, and believe in the Gospel.

To repent means to feel regret and sorrow and to change, or "turn from" what is evil. Gospel is a word meaning "good news." To "repent and believe in the Gospel" is the twofold call of the Christian, which is brought into profound relief during the Lenten season. This time of prayer and preparation for Easter shows there is indeed cause for regret and sorrow, and a need for change. And yet, what we are turning toward as we turn from sin is always cause for joy and hope.

Almighty and eternal God, protect the men and women who serve in our military. Protect them with the shield of Your strength and keep them safe from all evil and harm. May the power of Your love enable them to return home in safety, that with all who love them, they may ever praise You for Your loving care. Amen.

Presider Subject $\mathcal{T}o$ change

Lent is a season of penance and spiritual warfare. The enemy is concupiscence, the world, and the devil. The goal is pure hearts so that we can joyfully celebrate the resurrection of our Lord at Easter, the greatest feast of the liturgical year. In a way, Lent should be a microcosm of our entire struggle on earth, just as the Paschal feast of Easter is a microcosm of our heavenly triumph in Christ. Yet, a good Lent takes focus and discipline, and it can easily be wasted.

Many of us begin Lent with great intentions. We imagine going into full monk mode, fasting and praying. *Maybe* for the first week we succeed. Then, just when are feeling good about ourselves, everything falls apart and we come face to face with our own weakness. We've all been there at some point, and so today I'd like to share some practical tools for a good Lent.

- 1. Have a plan The fastest way to ruin Lent is to have good intentions but no plan. Be specific. One word of advice: Make it doable. Often, we are overly ambitious and commit to way too much. When we fail in our Lenten goals, we grow discouraged and give up completely. This is a victory for the devil. Make your commitments modest and practical, and your Lent will be the better for it.
- 2. Read a good book The saints are constantly exhorting us to read good spiritual books, and there is no better time to begin this practice than during Lent. Reading Scripture or the writings of the saints is a great place to start. Here are some suggestions for Lenten reading: *Meditations for Lent* by Jacques-Benigne Bossuet, *The Imitation of Christ* by Thomas a Kempis, *Humility of Heart* by Fr. Cajetan Mary da Bergamo *True Devotion to Mary* by St. Louis de Montfort, *The Spiritual Combat* by Dom Lorenzo Scupoli *Happy Are You Poor* by Fr. Thomas Dubay, *Letter to Friends of the Cross* and *Love of Eternal Wisdom* by St. Louis de Montfort.
- 3. Examine— Lent is an excellent time to take an inventory of the state of your soul. What are your faults? Do you have any hidden idols in your life? What is keeping you from following the will of God with all your heart? Use a thorough examination of conscience to help you assess your spiritual health. While taking inventory of your sins may be painful, it is a healthy pain that restores the soul.
- **4. Confess your sins** After examining your conscience, the next step is to go to confession. Before receiving the sacrament of penance, though, remember the five requirements for a good confession: a) Examination of conscience b) True contrition for having offended God c) Firm resolution to sin no more d) Clear confession (don't hold any sins back) e) Penance for the sins you have committed
- **5. Pray** Lent is a great time to plan and implement a daily prayer rule that can guide you the rest of the year. Focus your prayers on repentance and contrition for our sins. Here are some suggestions. The Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary; The Stations of the Cross; The Divine Mercy Chaplet. Take your time.
- **6. Fast** Fasting is the discipline of refraining from an earthly good, namely food, in order to hunger for the greater things of heaven. The no we say to the little pleasures empower us to say no to the greater temptations and evils. We are called to make acts of mortification along with fasting. This means allowing the little discomforts to be united with prayer. Are you consumed with your phone or social media? Give it up. On the other hand, maybe you're addicted to criticizing others. Make a special effort to refrain from negative speech. The point is, while fasting from certain foods is an excellent ascetical practice, we do not have to limit our Lenten disciplines to things we eat. Remember the words of Jesus: "If your eye offends you, pluck it out." Nothing should stand between us and the heavenly kingdom, and we should be intentional about cutting off those things that are causing us to sin.
- 7. Give alms During Lent, we remember the sacrifice of our Lord Jesus Christ on the cross. This is the greatest act of generosity in history, for Jesus died not just for his friends, but for his enemies. "God shows his love for us in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8). The generosity of God in Christ should impel us to be generous and merciful to others, especially those poor and in need. This Lent, find a way to give, whether it is supporting the Church or helping at a homeless shelter, etc. Remember the promise of Jesus, "And whoever gives to one of these little ones even a cup of cold water because he is a disciple, truly, I say to you, he shall not lose his reward."

This Lent, do your best with the grace of the Trinity. Strive to root out sin and cultivate holiness. But when you fail, let your failure be a lesson in humility that drives you back to the grace of God flowing from the pierced heart of Jesus—for that is the true heart of Lent.



Father Thomas F.B. Carroll Knights of Columbus Council 4566

On Sept 30, 1953, Father Thomas Carroll was assigned as an assistant at Holy Name of Mary RC Church in Valley Stream, NY. An exceptional basketball player in his seminary days, he was popular with the youth of the Parish. His dream was to establish a local Knights of Columbus council. Unfortunately before he could realize his dream, an accident claimed his life at age 44. Father Carroll sustained critical burns while enjoying a summer afternoon barbecue party with relatives and friends. He died on July 21, 1957, a few days after the accident. In early 1958 several members of the Holy Name Society formed a new council of the Knights of Columbus and named it the Father Thomas F. B. Carroll Council in his honor.



La Cuaresma es una temporada de penitencia y guerra espiritual. El enemigo es la concupiscencia, el mundo y el diablo. El objetivo son corazones puros para que podamos celebrar con alegría la resurrección de nuestro Señor en la Pascua, la fiesta más grande del año litúrgico. En cierto modo, la Cuaresma debería ser un microcosmos de toda nuestra lucha en la tierra, así como la fiesta pascual de la Pascua es un microcosmos de nuestro triunfo celestial en Cristo. Sin embargo, una buena Cuaresma requiere concentración y disciplina, y puede desperdiciarse fácilmente.

Muchos de nosotros comenzamos la Cuaresma con grandes intenciones. Nos imaginamos entrando en modo monje completo, ayunando y orando. Quizás durante la primera semana lo consigamos. Entonces, justo cuando nos sentimos bien con nosotros mismos, todo se desmorona y nos encontramos cara a cara con nuestra propia debilidad. Todos hemos pasado por eso en algún momento, y por eso hoy me gustaría compartir algunas herramientas prácticas para una buena Cuaresma.

- 1. Tenga un plan: la forma más rápida de arruinar la Cuaresma es tener buenas intenciones pero ningún plan. Se específico. Un consejo: hazlo factible. A menudo somos demasiado ambiciosos y nos comprometemos demasiado. Cuando fallamos en nuestras metas de Cuaresma, nos desanimamos y nos damos por vencidos por completo. Esta es una victoria para el diablo. Hagan sus compromisos modestos y prácticos, y su Cuaresma será mejor por ello.
- 2. Leer un buen libro Los santos nos exhortan constantemente a leer buenos libros espirituales y no hay mejor momento para comenzar esta práctica que durante la Cuaresma. Leer las Escrituras o los escritos de los santos es un excelente lugar para comenzar. Aquí hay algunas sugerencias para la lectura de Cuaresma: Meditaciones para la Cuaresma de Jacques-Benigne Bossuet, La imitación de Cristo de Tomás de Kempis, Humildad de corazón del P. María Cayetano de Bérgamo La verdadera devoción a María por San Luis de Montfort, El combate espiritual por Dom Lorenzo Scupoli Felices sois pobres por el P. Thomas Dubay, Carta a los Amigos de la Cruz y del Amor de la Sabiduría Eterna de San Luis de Montfort.
- 3. Examina: La Cuaresma es un momento excelente para hacer un inventario del estado de tu alma. ¿Cuales son tus defectos? ¿Tienes algún ídolo escondido en tu vida? ¿Qué te impide seguir la voluntad de Dios con todo tu corazón? Utilice un examen de conciencia exhaustivo para ayudarle a evaluar su salud espiritual. Si bien hacer un inventario de tus pecados puede ser doloroso, es un dolor saludable que restaura el alma.
- 4. Confiesa tus pecados Después del examen de conciencia, el siguiente paso es confesarte. Sin embargo, antes de recibir el sacramento de la penitencia, recuerde los cinco requisitos para una buena confesión: a) Examen de conciencia b) Verdadera contrición por haber ofendido a Dios c) Resolución firme de no pecar más d) Confesión clara (no retener ningún pecado) atrás) e) Penitencia por los pecados que has cometido
- 5. Ora La Cuaresma es un buen momento para planificar e implementar una regla de oración diaria que puede guiarte el resto del año. Enfoca tus oraciones en el arrepentimiento y la contrición por nuestros pecados. Aquí hay algunas sugerencias. Los Misterios Dolorosos del Rosario Las Estaciones de la Cruz La Coronilla de la Divina Misericordia. Tome su tiempo.
- 6. Ayuno El ayuno es la disciplina de abstenerse de un bien terrenal, es decir, la comida, para tener hambre de las cosas más grandes del cielo. El no que decimos a los pequeños placeres nos capacita para decir no a las tentaciones y males mayores. Estamos llamados a realizar actos de mortificación junto con el ayuno. Esto significa permitir que las pequeñas molestias se unan con la oración. ¿Estás consumido por tu teléfono o tus redes sociales? Ríndete. Por otro lado, tal vez seas adicto a criticar a los demás. Haga un esfuerzo especial por abstenerse de hablar negativamente. El punto es que, si bien el ayuno de ciertos alimentos es una excelente práctica ascética, no tenemos que limitar nuestras disciplinas de Cuaresma a las cosas que comemos. Recuerda las palabras de Jesús: "Si tu ojo te hace caer, sácatelo". Nada debe interponerse entre nosotros y el reino celestial, y debemos ser intencionales en eliminar aquellas cosas que nos hacen pecar.
- 7. Dar limosna Durante la Cuaresma, recordamos el sacrificio de nuestro Señor Jesucristo en la cruz. Este es el mayor acto de generosidad de la historia, porque Jesús murió no sólo por sus amigos, sino también por sus enemigos. "Dios muestra su amor para con nosotros, en que siendo aún pecadores, Cristo murió por nosotros" (Romanos 5:8). La generosidad de Dios en Cristo debería impulsarnos a ser generosos y misericordiosos con los demás, especialmente con los pobres y necesitados.

Esta Cuaresma, encuentre una manera de dar, ya sea apoyando a la Iglesia o ayudando en un refugio para personas sin hogar, etc. Recuerde la promesa de Jesús: "Y cualquiera que le dé a uno de estos pequeños aunque sea un vaso de agua fría, porque es un discípulo, de cierto te digo que no perderá su recompensa". Esta Cuaresma, haz lo mejor que puedas con la gracia de la Trinidad. Esfuércese por erradicar el pecado y cultivar la santidad. Pero cuando fracases, deja que tu fracaso sea una lección de humildad que te lleve de regreso a la gracia de Dios que fluye del corazón traspasado de Jesús, porque ese es el verdadero corazón de la Cuaresma.
