Readings for Palm Sunday

1st Reading: Mark 11:1-10 or John 12:12-16 Jesus is rendered due honor as He enters the city of David.
Psalm 22:8-9, 17-18, 19-20, 23-24 The ancient poet prophetically describes the death of God's faithful one.
2nd Reading: Philippians 2:6-11 St. Paul presents the Crucifixion as a cosmic event of submission and glory.
Gospel: Mark 14:1-15:47 Mark presents good and bad examples of discipleship in his Passion account.
FOCUS: Christ became obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.

During his journey to Golgotha, Jesus goes from hailed hero to crucified criminal. He surrenders out of obedience to his Father and love for us. As followers of Jesus, we, too, can face loss and sacrifice. Jesus knows what it means to sacrifice out of love. We journey together through loss, never alone, but always united with Jesus.

to learn how to grow in devotion to St. Joseph during the Lenten season. St. Joseph is a great exemplar for us of Lenten virtues that we do well to ponder and emulate.

He first teaches us about the silence needed in Lent. The state of the desert is meant to be one of exterior and interior silence. when we remove ourselves from the distractions that crowd our lives with so much noise that we can't hear God and so much clutter that we can't see him. St. Joseph is a man of silence, who didn't speak a word in sacred Scripture. Silence is a form of asceticism. It's not so much an emptying but an active listening to the God who in silence speaks. In 2005, Pope Benedict stated that in a world like ours, which does not foster quiet and recollection, we all need to be "infected" with St. Joseph's silence so that we can hear God's voice.

Second, St. Joseph teaches us about the obedience Lent cultivates. On Palm Sunday, St. Paul tells us, "Have the save mindset that is in Christ Jesus, who ... humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, death on a Cross" (Philippians 2:5-8). Lent is about learning to obey as Christ obeyed. St. Joseph shows us the way. We see his prompt obedience in his response to God who spoke to him in dreams not to be afraid to receive Mary into his home, to arise and flee with Jesus and Mary to Egypt, and to return with them to Galilee. It would have been easy for Joseph, even in a pre-Freudian age, to deconstruct these dreams according to the standard of his conscious desires. Each dream was asking him to do something lifechanging. In each of these circumstances, however, Joseph obeyed immediately. He teaches us how to have Christ's obedient mindset.

Third, he was obedient precisely because he was faithful. He believed in what God was telling him through the angel and therefore did what God was commanding. Pope Benedict said in 09, "Throughout all of history, Joseph is the man who gives God the greatest display of trust, even in the face of such astonishing news." During this season in which we are called to repent and believe in the Gospel, Joseph is, like Abraham, a true father in faith who shows us what believing the Good News looks like.

Fourth, he shows us how to be a "just man" (Matthew 1:19). To be "just" means to be "righteous" or in right relationship with God, in short, to be holy. Lent is a season of training in holiness and Joseph shows us what holiness is. It's to "ad-just" ourselves to God's will, something that he constantly did and teaches us to do.

March 19 always falls within the 40 days of Lent, it is important Fifth, he is a man of humility. Lent is a season in which we humble ourselves and learn "to walk humbly with [our] God" (Micah 6:8). Our penitence and penances are humble signs of our need for God and our almsgiving is meant to form us, like Christ, not to be served but to serve and give our life for others (Matthew 20:28). St. Joseph learned humility not only through putting himself totally at the service of God's plans for Jesus and Mary, but even in the way he exercised his leadership in the holy family. Joseph, not the Immaculate Virgin or the Wordmade-flesh, would have, in accordance with Jewish tradition, led the prayers in the home in the morning, evening and on principal religious feasts. He would have been the one who trained the One through whom all things were made to be a carpenter. The lesser one was placed over the Greater. Such activity can only overwhelm one with humility.

> Sixth, he is a man of chaste love. The devil's supreme temptation is to corrupt love, since we were created in the image of God who is love, and are called to love God with all we've got and others as Christ does. One cannot be holy without chastity, which helps to keep love pure. That's why St. Paul, as soon as he writes, "This is God's will for you, your sanctification," adds, "Therefore, avoid all unchastity" (1 Thessalonians 4:3). Holiness is the perfection of love; chastity keeps love unselfish. In a promiscuous and pornographic age, one that cannot understand Christ's celibacy, the chaste celibacy of priests and religious in his image, and the call to chaste continence for those outside of marriage and chaste love of those within, St. Joseph is a model and intercessor who shows our culture how to turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel.

> Seventh, he teaches us how to prepare well for death. On Ash Wednesday, we were reminded that we are dust and unto dust we shall return. As we prepare to enter liturgically into Christ's death, we are meant to prepare for our own, by losing our lives in order to save them (Matthew 16:25). St. Joseph is the patron saint of a happy death because, Christian piety has always believed, he died in Jesus' and Mary's arms, entrusting them to God the Father's providence and receiving from them prayers and comfort. He shows us not just how to die in their arms but to live in them, as they seek to accompany us, as they did him, through death into eternity.



St. Ambrose Sansedoni (March 20). At birth, St. Ambrose was very deformed and needed the care of a nurse. While in St. Mary Magdalene Church, the nurse reported that an unknown pilgrim said, *"Do not cover that child's face. He will one day be the glory of this city."* A few days later the child stretched out his deformed limbs saying the name *"Jesus"* and he was healed; all his deformities were gone. As a child, Ambrose prayed and meditated during the night and was drawn to reading the lives of the saints. At 17, he joined the Dominicans and was sent to study for the priesthood with St. Thomas Aquinas. As a priest he devoted himself to preaching and teaching. He became well known for his elegant preaching. He also became a peacemaker; restoring peace between Venice and Genoa and also between Florence and Pisa.





A Brief Examination of Conscience

Based on the Ten Commandments

I am the LORD your God: you shall not have strange Gods before me.

Have I treated people, events, or things as more important than God?

You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain.

Have my words, actively or passively, put down God, the Church, or people?

Remember to keep holy the LORD's Day.

Do I go to Mass every Sunday (or Saturday Vigil) and on Holy Days of Obligation (Jan. 1; the Ascension; Aug. 15; Nov. 1; Dec. 8; Dec. 25)? Do I avoid, when possible, work that impedes worship to God, joy for the Lord's Day, and proper relaxation of mind and body? Do I look for ways to spend time with family or in service on Sunday?

Honor your father and your mother.

Do I show my parents due respect? Do I seek to maintain good communication with my parents where possible? Do I criticize them for lacking skills I think they should have?

You shall not kill.

Have I harmed another through physical, verbal, or emotional means, including gossip or manipulation of any kind?

You shall not commit adultery.

Have I respected the physical and sexual dignity of others and of myself?

You shall not steal.

Have I taken or wasted time or resources that belonged to another?



Celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

Have I gossiped, told lies, or embellished stories at the expense of another?

You shall not covet your neighbor's spouse.

Have I honored my spouse with my full affection and exclusive love?

You shall not covet your neighbor's goods.

Am I content with my own means and needs, or do I compare myself to others unnecessarily?

Christ's Two Commandments

How well do we love God and others? Do we love as Christ calls us to? In the Gospel of Matthew, Christ gives us Two Commandments: "He said to him, 'You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments'" (Mt 22:37-40).

Not sure what love is? St. Paul describes it for us in his Letter to the Corinthians. Is this how you love God and others? "Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, [love] is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quicktempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails" (1 Cor 13:4-8).

Act of Contrition

O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended Thee, and I detest all my sins, because I dread the loss of Heaven and the pains of hell, but most of all because they offend Thee, my God, Who are all good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve with the help of Thy grace to confess my sins, to do penance, and to amend my life. Amen.



Eucharistic Prayer Companion for the Lenten Season & Sacred Triduum

These Eucharistic Meditations are designed to help you spend 30 minutes to an hour in meditation and silent prayer with Jesus during Eucharistic adoration. Even if you cannot be physically present in a church or adoration chapel with the Blessed Sacrament, you can unite yourself spiritually to the Eucharist as you spend this time in prayer.

Each Eucharistic Meditation will follow this format:

- Begin with the opening prayers, asking Jesus for the grace of that week. This prayer is intended to help us learn how to seek a gift from God in prayer.
- 🐈 Pray with the Scripture passage provided. Be open to this encounter with Jesus.
 - Read that week's passage, usually from the Old Testament, 3–4 times slowly. Allow the words of Scripture to wash
 over your mind and heart. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through this passage.
 - Sit with a series of reflection questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.
 - Read the next passage, usually from the Gospels, 3–4 times slowly. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you personally
 through this passage.
 - Spend time in silence with the Lord using the next reflection question. Allow him to speak to your heart in that
 silence. Receive his presence. If it helps, write down what you sense the Lord communicating to you during this
 time of prayer.
- Pray the Closing Prayer, usually taken from the Collect for Mass.
- 🐈 Reflect on the liturgical connection and Love in Action prompt each week.

Thank you for praying with us as we seek to spend time with our Eucharistic Lord.

Fifth Sunday of Lent: Following Where God Leads



WORK OF MERCY: Comfort the Sorrowful

THE GRACE I SEEK: to follow the Lord wherever he leads me

IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. AMEN.

Pause for a few moments, and allow yourself to become aware of Jesus' gift of himself in the Eucharist. Realize that, at this very moment, the Lord of Life is gazing upon you with great love. Allow yourself to receive his loving gaze. You are his beloved child. Rest in his loving gaze.

Thank Jesus for the gift of himself in the Eucharist.

ASK FOR THE GRACE: Jesus, help me to follow you wherever you go.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3–4 times. Allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through this passage.

"But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD. I will place my law within them, and write it upon their hearts; I will be their God, and they shall be my people." (Jeremiah 31:33)

REFLECTION QUESTION — Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.

Today we hear the Lord promise us that he establishes a covenant with us. He promises to form our hearts and to be our God. In what areas of your life do you doubt his promise to be your God and to be present in your heart? Be specific and ask the Lord how he wants to be present in those places of your life.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3–4 times. Again, allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Let the Holy Spirit speak to you through this passage.

"Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will my servant be. The Father will honor whoever serves me." (John 12:26)

REFLECTION QUESTION — Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.

Today we are given quite the challenge: if we serve Jesus, we MUST follow him wherever he leads! However, he also promises that the Father honors all who do this. Do you sense a place in your life where Jesus is trying to lead you, but you are afraid to follow because you don't have all the answers yet? Give this fear to the Lord, asking for his loving presence to comfort you and encourage you.

Remain in silence with the Lord. Allow him to speak in the silence, in your heart. Receive his presence. If it helps, write down what you sense the Lord communicating to you during this time of prayer.

CLOSING PRAYER — By your help, we beseech you, Lord our God, may we walk eagerly in that same charity with which, out of love for the world, your Son handed himself over to death. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen. (Collect, Fifth Sunday of Lent)

SUNDAY MASS CONNECTION — At every Mass, Jesus offers himself to the Father for us. We can always join our own offerings with Jesus at Mass. This Sunday, offer your desire to whole-heartedly follow Jesus wherever he leads you.

LOVE IN ACTION — In the busyness of daily life, it can often be a challenge to look beyond our own struggles and difficulties to follow the Lord's command to care for others, especially when they are suffering. Is there someone in your life who is really struggling right now, perhaps with disappointment or grief? Ask the Lord how he wants you to comfort them, trusting that this will be part of following him more closely.
