Christmas 2024

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

Merry Christmas to you and your families!

Last Christmas, we celebrated the 800th anniversary of that glorious and historic night when St. Francis of Assisi arranged the first Nativity creche scene in a small cave outside the Italian village of Greccio in Italy.

St. Francis was inspired to do this after visiting the historical place of Christ's birth on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land – the humble stable in a Bethlehem cave.

The large creche set in St. Peter's Square last year commemorated this 800th anniversary by having the figure of St. Francis of Assisi expressing adoration, awe and wonder across the Crib from Mary and Joseph.

Last September, we celebrated the 800th Anniversary of St. Francis receiving the gift of the "stigmata" – the mystical wounds of Christ in his hands, feet and side. In 2026, we will celebrate the 800th anniversary of St. Francis' death.

There is always a powerful connection between the Manger Crib and the Golgotha Cross of our Savior. St. Francis of Assisi lived this connection so powerfully.

In Admirabile Signum, Pope Francis writes: "Indeed, the place where this first nativity scene was enacted expresses and evokes these sentiments...from the time of its Franciscan origins, the nativity scene has invited us to 'feel' and 'touch' the poverty that God's Son took upon himself in the Incarnation. Implicitly, it summons us to follow him along the path of humility, poverty and self-denial that leads from the manger of Bethlehem to the Cross. It asks us to meet him and serve him by showing mercy to those of our brothers and sisters in great need (cf. Matthew 25:31-46)." (3)

As we spiritually draw near to Bethlehem at the end of this year, we pray for those who suffer in the Holy Land and the Middle East, in Ukraine and all war-torn areas of the world.

We pray too for the persecuted Church around the world and we pray for religious liberty in our country and in all countries.

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St. Francis of Assisi understood the problems of the world and more than 800 years later, after he created the first creche, he is still close to the Church and to the world.

Many of you have seen the bronze statue of Atlas directly across from St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City.

It was created by the sculptor Lee Lawrie and installed in 1937. The sculpture portrays the mythical ancient Greek Titan Atlas holding the burden of the heavens on his shoulder.

St. Francis of Assisi is no myth, but at times he has been compared with Atlas in how, through the centuries, he carried the burdens of the Church on his shoulders with his radical and pure Gospel witness.

In fact, Pope Innocent III, after meeting St. Francis, had a dream that St. Francis was holding up St. John Lateran Basilica, the visible sign and symbol of the universal Church, amidst the storms and earthquakes of history and crisis.

Configured to Christ crucified and having lived daily with the stigmatic wounds of Christ, St. Francis helps to animate and inspire the mission of mercy of the Catholic Church through the centuries.

St. Francis of Assisi intercedes for each of us at every moment to help rebuild the Biblical and Eucharistic evangelizing mission of the Church that Jesus Himself founded on Long Island and beyond.

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you and your families!

May the Light and Love of the Christ Child animate and guide our global Catholic Missionary Spirit this Christmas and throughout the New Year.

I don't want any gifts, gift certificates, or sweets. Instead, all I want for Christmas is for you to go to confession.



Navidad 2024

Al pueblo de Dios de la Diócesis del Rockville Centre:

¡Feliz Navidad para ustedes y sus familias!

La Navidad pasada, celebramos el 800 aniversario de esa noche gloriosa e histórica cuando San Francisco de Asís realizó la primera escena del Pesebre en una pequeña cueva a las afueras del pueblo italiano de Greccio en Italia.

San Francisco se sintió inspirado para hacer esto después de visitar el lugar histórico del nacimiento de Cristo en una peregrinación a la Tierra Santa, el humilde establo en una cueva de Belén.

El gran Pesebre que se puso en la Plaza de San Pedro el año pasado conmemoró este 800 aniversario al incluir la figura de San Francisco de Asís expresando adoración, asombro y sobrecogimiento frente a la cuna del Pesebre, con Mary y Joseph.

En septiembre pasado, celebramos también el 800 aniversario de cuando San Francisco recibiera el regalo de los "estigmas", las heridas místicas de Cristo en sus manos, pies y costado. En el 2026, celebraremos el 800 aniversario de la muerte de San Francisco.

Siempre hay una conexión muy fuerte entre la cuna del Pesebre y la cruz del Gólgota de nuestro Salvador. San Francisco de Asís vivió esta conexión muy intensamente.

En Admirabile Signum, el Papa Francisco escribe: "De hecho, el lugar donde se representó esta primera escena de la natividad expresa y evoca estos sentimientos ... desde la época de sus orígenes franciscanos, la escena de la natividad nos ha invitado a 'sentir' y 'tocar' la pobreza que el Hijo de Dios asumió en sí mismo con la Encarnación. Implícitamente, nos convoca a seguirlo por el camino de la humildad, la pobreza y la abnegación que conduce del pesebre de Belén a la cruz. Nos pide que lo encontremos y lo sirvamos mostrando misericordia a nuestros hermanos y hermanas más necesitados (cf. Mateo 25: 31-46)". (3)

A medida que nos acercamos espiritualmente a Belén al finalizar este año, recemos por aquellos que sufren en Tierra Santa y Oriente Medio, en Ucrania y en todas las áreas devastadas por la guerra en el mundo.

Oremos también por la iglesia perseguida en todo el mundo y recemos por la libertad religiosa en nuestro país y en todos los países.

San Francisco de Asís entendió los problemas del mundo y después de más de 800 años de haber creado el primer pesebre, todavía está cerca de la Iglesia y del mundo.

Muchos de ustedes han visto la estatua de bronce de Atlas que está justo en frente a la Catedral de San Patricio en la ciudad de Nueva York.

Fue creada por el escultor Lee Lawrie e instalada en 1937. La escultura retrata al mítico antiguo Titán griego Atlas, que sostiene la carga de los cielos sobre sus hombros.

San Francisco de Asís no es un mito, pero a veces se le ha comparado con Atlas en cómo, a través de los siglos, llevó la carga de la Iglesia sobre sus hombros con su testimonio de evangelio radical y puro.

De hecho, el Papa Inocencio III, después de encontrarse con San Francisco, soñó que San Francisco estaba sosteniendo la Basílica de San Juan de Letrán, el signo y símbolo visible de la Iglesia Universal, en medio de las tormentas y terremotos de la historia y de las crisis.

Configurado con Cristo crucificado y habiendo vivido diariamente con las heridas estigmáticas de Cristo, San Francisco ayuda a animar y a inspirar la misión de misericordia de la Iglesia Católica a través de los siglos.

San Francisco de Asís intercede por cada uno de nosotros en cada momento para que ayudemos a reconstruir la misión evangelizadora, Bíblica y Eucarística, de la Iglesia que Jesús mismo fundó en Long Island y más allá.

St. John of the Cross Born in Castile, Spain, St. Juan de Yepes lived in poverty. St. John embraced poverty and

suffering throughout his life. In 1563, he entered the Carmelite Order. He befriended St. Teresa of Ávila, who encouraged and supported him in his efforts at reform. He faced opposition and he was imprisoned in a tower. From this experience came the mystical poetry and inspired writings on the interior life that made him a Doctor of the Church.

Close to the Infant Jesus

"You are nowhere but close to the Infant Jesus, trembling with cold in the stable of Bethlehem...Therefore, I beg you to love the crib of the Child of Bethlehem...stay close to him and be sure that Jesus is in the midst of your hearts more than you could believe or imagine." St. Padre Pio

Two Advent practices for a joyful Christmas

Each Advent, God invites us to deepen our friendship with Him and draw closer to His love. The key to a joyful Christmas lies in responding to this invitation by dedicating daily time to God and helping those in need.

Do the one thing needful: Pope Francis encourages us to "waste time" with God through prayer, even for just 15–20 minutes. This could be offering daily prayers for a special intention, meditating on the Christmas Story a verse at a time, or simply being peacefully

present to Him, who is always present to us.

Continue spending time with Him after the season ends.

Go in haste to love: Just as Mary went "with haste" (Luke 1:39) to serve her cousin Elizabeth, we, too, are called to act quickly in love. While no one can do everything, everyone can do something. When we serve others even in small ways, we receive a greater gift in return (Matthew 25:40).

Embrace these practices for a deeper, more joyful Christmas open to God's love.

Luke 2:41-52, Love and obedience

The Feast of the Holy Family (December 29) includes the story of finding Jesus in the Temple, a story of love and obedience. Jesus, Mary, and Joseph traveled to Jerusalem for the Passover. as was the custom for Jews of that time. They traveled in a large group for protection against bandits who infested the hill country. So it wasn't surprising that His parents didn't miss Jesus as they started the return trip. Upon discovering Him missing, they hurried back to Jerusalem.

On the third day of searching, they found Jesus in the Temple. He was

questioning the priests and amazing them with His understanding.

However, Mary asked how He could have caused His parents so much worry and Jesus replied, "Did you not know I must be in my Father's house?"

Though they were puzzled by His

answer, Mary and Joseph took Jesus back to Nazareth. He remained there in obedience to His parents until it was time for His public ministry. We learn from this story to obey not only God but also those in valid authority over us.



December 1 - First Sunday in Advent. We anticipate Christ's birth and His coming on the Last Day. Catholics everywhere light candles in an Advent wreath to signal the coming of the light of Christ.

December 4 – St. John Damascene (749). A Doctor of the Church and the last of the Greek Fathers, St. John was born in Muslim-ruled Syria and was counselor to the caliph. He is known for his writings in favor of the use of sacred images for devotion.

December 9 - Immaculate

Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. We commemorate that Mary was conceived in St. Anne's womb without original sin, preparing Mary to be the Mother of God. Pope Pius IX declared this doctrine in 1854. This year, it's still considered a holy day of obligation and Mass attendance is required.

December 28 – Feast of the Holy Innocents (1st century). Today, we remember the infants massacred by King Herod's soldiers (Matthew 2:16-18). We also pray for the safety of unborn children.





How do I use an Advent Wreath?

The Advent Wreath is a circle of evergreen branches, symbolizing God's eternal and unending love. It includes three purple (violet) candles and one pink (rose) candle. On the first Sunday of Advent, and each night that week, the first purple candle, known as the Prophet's Candle, is lit



to symbolize hope. On the second Sunday and throughout that week, light both the first and second purple candles.

The second candle, called the Bethlehem Candle, represents faith. The pink candle, lit during the third week, symbolizes joy and marks Gaudete Sunday. During the fourth week of Advent, all three purple candles and the pink candle are lit. The fourth candle, known as the Angel's Candle, represents peace.

Consider meditating on Scripture as you light the candles. Week 1 (hope) -Isaiah 9:2-7, week 2 (faith) - Micah 5:2-5a, week 3 (joy) - Luke 2:8-14, and week 4 (peace) - Luke 1:26-38.
